


a) View from Above: provides a close view into the foliage of the tree




view into portal




b) Change your Perspective: contains an upside-down view of the entryway






view looking up

e) Stand Back and Look: holds an image made of dots of an apricot tree as seen from afar



Color Palette

Perspectives

Perspectives is an exterior interactive public art proposal for the Lakewood Branch Library & Learning Center in Sunnyvale, CA. The idea for this project is a distillation of the concepts embedded in the architecture of the facility and the community's desires mentioned in the RFQ. The piece is comprised of six elements that are located in the parking lot and entry area.

Each element is a meditation on visual perception—they use mechanisms and strategies whereby what we see is altered, highly focused, or distorted in some way. They work with simple mechanisms and employ the sun, color, mirrors, etc. The title of each piece is inscribed into the base and are referential to idiomatic expressions.

The Pieces:

A. View from Above

is a periscope piece that offers a view into a nearby tree. You will see a close-up view of leaves, and a bird or squirrel if you are lucky!

B. Change your Perspective

is a camera obscura, a light box that operates in a similar fashion as a camera. When you peer into the portal, you will see an upside-down view focused on the building's entryway.

C. See the Local Color

is based on the colors of the color wheel. Six colors are represented with photographs of elements from nature- the yellow sun, an orange sky, a red rose, violet flowers, blue water, and green leaves. These macro photographs would be printed onto glass. They cast colorful shadows onto the ground, and present saturated colors that are backlit from the sky.

D. Interrupt a Pattern

uses a layering of a simple dot pattern that creates a moiré pattern that shimmers and shifts as the two patterns interrupt each other. One of the discs rotates in order to emphasize the phenomenon.

E. Stand Back and Look

is an image of an apricot tree that is created from many small dots that are cut into the metal plate. The image comes into focus when viewed from a distance and appears abstract at a close viewing.

F. See the Light

harnesses the sun to create shadows cast onto a surface. This form, reminiscent of an open book, is inscribed with an upside-down quote. The quote is by the author Jun'ichirō Tanizaki, "Were it not for shadows there would be no beauty." This fleeting text will only appear when the sun is strong.

This set of six pieces is constructed with powder-coated aluminum, each with a unique color. The color palette is based on foliage. The view portals are about 4 ft – 6 in above the ground. It is possible to create secondary viewports for the two pieces with singular portals (during design development) to accommodate small children and wheelchair users.

This project is based on the concept of biophilic design that attempts to make visceral connections to natural phenomenon. It also attempts to appeal to the wide range of demographics and ages of people who frequent the library including children. These portals aspire to offer delight and reflection on one's immediate environment.

Narrative

MATERIALS and MAINTENANCE REPORT

DIMENSIONS

There are six elements ranging from about 9 ft tall to 5 ft tall. They each occupy an area ranging from 3 ft x 3 ft to 4 ft x 4 ft.

MEDIUM

- elements are constructed from ½ inch thick aluminum.
- vertical rods are 3 inch diameter aluminum.

The piece has the following powder-coated colors:

Tiger Drylac Color RAL 6034, RAL 6011, RAL 6019, RAL 1027, RAL 5019, and RAL 6025.
