Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission

Category One: I am a bicyclist or pedestrian residing in Sunnyvale.

Yes

Like many Santa Clara County cities, Sunnyvale is faced with problems stemming from traffic congestion and air pollution. Suggest ways the City can improve facilities for bicyclists and pedestrians. Also, how might the City improve education and safety programs for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians?

The city is making promising progress in making the city safer for cyclists and pedestrians with projects like the Hollenbeck Bike Lane study. I've appreciated how much community input the city takes into account when undergoing these projects, and I believe there is room for improvement. For example, neighbors near Washington Park petitioned together to create a study of speed limit for motorists on Washington Ave next to the park, and after months of effort we were able to get a study on the books for this summer. Can we make these improvement suggestions easier by creating an easily accessible public database of all proposed studies, and allow Sunnyvale residents submit new ones as well as vote for the existing issues on the table? Signs around the city with a textable number can also make it much more accessible for residents to send in feedback, like "text this number to send in your feedback about this road / intersection / park"

Relatedly, Sunnyvale residents can be better educated about how they can get involved in the safety of their transportation - I can see something like creating a summer challenge around attending a variety of different events around the city related to transportation safety, like a seminar at the library about bike safety or info sessions at school for street safety, then the winners of this challenge get a meet and greet or a shared Perry Park Ride with the mayor. Cross-pollination with local activist groups and businesses like the Silicon Valley Bike Coalition and Walt's Cycle can further compound the impact of these educational programming and make a larger and longer-lasting impact throughout the city.

What are your thoughts on the Active Transportation Plan?

I'm encouraged to see that the ATP prioritizes biking and walking as more desired modes of transportation than driving, especially driving alone. The amount of community input that was collected and taken into account is impressive and insightful. As a commuter cyclist myself who came from a city that had a very visible bike culture, I'm hopeful that the various safety improvements and programming recommendations in the ATP will lead to a more vibrant biking and walking culture in Sunnyvale, and help us hit the 10% of commuters are cyclists in 2030 metric (from the disappointing 2017 number of 1.5%).

I also want to applaud the efforts of the Bicycle Rodeo Kits for schools, it seems very apt that to change the transportation culture of a city we start with our children in schools.

One suggestion I have for the ATP is more recognition for the carpooling option. It seems like a viable on-ramp solution between driving solo and biking/public transportation, and is a good opportunity to build community within the people who already share a school or workplace in common. I can see programming collaboration with various schools and employers in the area for some kind of incentive for carpooling.

A plan is only as effective as it is actively acknowledged, and Vision Zero seems to be well known as a common goal that the commission and the community is systematically working towards addressing.</p> <p>However, I did not hear about Vision Zero until I started tuning in to the commission meetings, and I believe a better PSA effort can be put forward by the city and various community organizations to make this goal well known through Sunnyvale and align its residents to work towards this goal together.</p>

Sustainability is a new and emerging concern in many communities. What do you think are the primary sustainability policy issues this commission will be addressing over the next few years?

Sustainability is a way of life, and adds up from singular actions that each one of us makes on a daily basis. Decisions like food, waste disposal, water and energy usage, mode of transportation, are all consumer-centric topics that the commission can address. For example, shopping at the farmers market instead of Costco, or carpooling/biking to work instead of driving alone. There are so many small improvements that Sunnyvale residents can be encouraged to make that will make a big difference in the long run.

On a more commercial level, setting incentives for reducing carbon emission could encourage the entire supply chain to be more environmentally conscience. For example, the LEED-certified city hall is a source of pride for many, and local parks that house luscious native plants are pleasing to the eye and a great educational moment for residents who are looking to inspiration for their own front yards.
