BRIEF PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Use Permit to allow a child care facility within an existing 34,948 square foot church building (Sunnyvale International Church). The proposed use will occupy nearly 4,300 square foot area of the building, and include two classrooms. The program will accommodate children ages up to 50 children (ages between 2 years to 5 years) and 4 employees. The project includes 1,760 square feet outdoor play area. The proposed use requires a Use Permit from the City of Sunnyvale.

DETAILED PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Surrounding Uses and Setting:

The project site is in the northern part of the City and bordered by Hetch Hetchy ROW and Seven Seas Park in the north, E Weddell Drive and U.S. Highway 101 in the south, Morse Avenue on the west and educational and religious uses towards the east.

On-site Development: The proposed childcare facility will operate within the existing building. The applicant proposes to remove 8 parking spaces and convert to an outdoor play area enclosed by a 6-foot-tall wrought iron fence and partially shaded by solar fabric supported on wood posts. No off-site improvements are proposed as part of this application.

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EVALUATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS:

Further Discussion if Less Than Significant with or without mitigation:

14, 16. Noise (Less than Significant) – The subject site is adjacent to U.S. Highway 101, which is the primary noise source in the area. The proposed childcare use will occupy parts of an existing 34,900 square feet church building and a new outdoor play area, which are located away from the highway. The outdoor play area is located south of the Hetch Hetchy right-of-way and Seven Seas Park. The nearest residential uses are approximately 200 feet from the project site.

In 2016, a Use Permit was approved for a Ppublic middle school use within the existing structure at 539 E Weddell. A noise study for that project indicated that the interior noise level of the structures at 521 E. Weddell Dr would have a day-night average noise level of less than 45 dBa DNL and hourly average noise levels would range from 39 to 40 Dba Leq, which is less than significant impact. The study further indicated that the noise levels at the southernmost boundary of the Seven Seas Park is within the City's normally acceptable threshold for neighborhood parks and playgrounds.

30. Air Quality (Less than Significant) – In 2016, a Use Permit was approved for a public middle school use within the existing structure at 539 E Weddell. The Air Quality study for the project concluded that the combination of all the toxic air contaminants (TAC) would not exceed the significance threshold and would be less than significant impact.
