Overview of Safe Parking

What is Safe Parking?

- A safe place to park off-street on a temporary basis -- in approved locations
- Most often managed by a social service or faith-based provider
- Can serve RV's and/or cars
- Access to health, social services & hygiene resources



Total 2023 Sunnyvale Point In Time (PIT) Count




2023-2024 VI-SPDAT Assessment Data-Sunnyvale




What services do you need from a Safe Parking Program?

Safe Parking Community Meeting-July 2024 cont'd

Summary of Concerns	How Concerns Will Be Addressed
Safety/Crime	 Submit operating plan during the permit process City Monitoring City will approve all program policies and screening procedures
Trash/Debris	 Application requires management plan for: Trash, Recycling & Black Water Ordinance includes "no outside storage" around vehicles City Monitoring
Noise	Ordinance includes noise management requirements
Amenities & Resources for Program Participants	 Staff is recommending developing a robust SP program based on best practices



Steps for Developing a Safe Parking Program on Public Land





General Fund Safe Parking Grants

General Fund Safe Parking Grants

Small General Fund Grants

- Community-based (CBO) or faith-based organizations (FBO)
- Seeking Start Up Funds to develop a Safe Parking Program
 - CBO/FBO responsible for ongoing operating and supportive services funding
 - Grants are one-time funding through a competitive grant process
 - All grantees will be monitored by the City and report on outcomes



Recommendation

Alternatives

- 1. Introduce an Ordinance to allow Safe Parking and Find Action is Exempt from CEQA
- 2. Pursue Implementing a Safe Parking Pilot Program on Public Land
- Direct staff to prepare a Budget Issue for consideration with the FY 2025-2026 Budget for a General Fund grant
- 4. Alternatives 1,2 and 3 with Modifications
- 5. Do not adopt ordinance nor direct staff on further action
