Drawing the Lines

- » Legal Considerations
 - Population equality
 - Federal Voting Rights Act (FVRA)
 - No racial gerrymandering



- Communities of interest
- Geography/topography
- Territory cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity and compactness
- Other criteria approved by courts



Population Equality

- » Total population equality (2010 Census) overriding criterion when drawing districts, not citizens or eligible voters
- » Some deviation is acceptable to serve governmental interests in local electoral districts
 - Must be applied even-handedly
- » Total deviation less than 10% presumptively constitutional
 - Caution! The presumption can be challenged




Population Equality

» Total Sunnyvale
Population (2010

Census): 140,081

» Ideal Population SixCouncil Districts: 23,347



Population Equality

- Deviation is calculated by summing the amount by which the largest district exceeds the ideal population for a district and the amount by which the smallest district falls short of the ideal population.
 - Example:

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Largest District - Ideal Population = A

Ideal Population - Smallest District = B

Total Deviation = A +B

Total Deviation % = (A+B)/Ideal Population
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Federal Voting Rights Act (FVRA)


- Prohibits electoral practices, which deny to racial and language minority voting rights an equal opportunity to nominate and elect candidates of their choice.
- "Language minorities" are specifically defined to mean persons of American Indian, Asian American, Alaskan Natives or Spanish heritage.
 - CVRA expressly adopts the definition of "language minority."
- » Absent discriminatory intent, creation of minority districts required only if minority group can form a majority of eligible voters (ACS data).








Federal Voting Rights Act (FVRA): Cracking






Federal Voting Rights Act (FVRA): Packing





No Racial Gerrymandering

» Fourteenth Amendment restricts the use of race as the "predominant" criterion in drawing districts and the subordination of other considerations



» Bizarrely shaped electoral districts can be evidence that racial considerations predominate.

Other Permissible Criteria

- » Elections Code § 21620 specifies discretionary criteria Council may consider:
 - 1. Communities of interest
 - 2. Topography
 - 3. Geography
 - 4. Cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory



California Voting Rights Act (CVRA)


- » CVRA does not contain any districting criteria
- » Appears to protect minority voting influence
- » No case law defines "influence"
- » FVRA does not prohibit creation of "influence districts" if consistent with other principles (i.e. communities of interest, compactness, etc.)

Other Criteria Approved by Courts

- » Preventing head-to-head contests between incumbents, to the extent reasonably possible.
- » Respecting the boundaries of other political subdivisions (e.g., school attendance areas, etc.).
- » Use of whole census geography (e.g., census blocks).
- » Other non discriminatory considerations unique to the jurisdiction.


Public Input on District Boundary Criteria

- » Largest average ranking represents the most preferred choice
- » Most people prioritized:
 - Communities of Interest
 - Cohesive geographic areas
 - Visible boundaries
- » Limited interest in:
 - Future population growth
 - Similar voting choices



Sunnyvale's Communities of Interest

- Homeowners Associations (HOAs)
- Mobile Home Parks
- Residential Neighborhoods
- Physical boundaries
 - Across Highway 101
 - Fremont Avenue
 - Fair Oaks Avenue
- School Boundaries



Drawing the Lines: Draft Plans

- » An exercise in balancing criteria
- » More than one draft map is common there is no one perfect map!
- » Draft maps are intended to be modified at the discretion of the City Council considering public comment and the Council's own knowledge of the City.
