

Apricot flowers reference the region's orchard-farming history, Milkweed highlights the monarch butterfly's migration through the valley, and the delicate yet resilient California Poppies are among the first flowers to reappear after wildfires.

This series was first inspired by the California poppy, which thrive in harsh conditions and return after wildfires, symbolizing resilience and healing.

4. Title: Regeneration, Market Street Mural, part 3

**Description:** I began this series by photographing the poppies in my garden, then used procedural manipulations through the Perlin noise algorithm to alter and distort them. Their vibrant orange petals glow with joy and energy, similar to stained glass.

The video and soundscape evoked the movements of fire, air, and water, providing a new and exciting experience, while the mural on its own added color and movement to California Avenue.



# **Concept Overview**

My proposed bench design for Corn Palace Park draws from my ongoing *Regeneration* series, which explores themes of resilience, transformation, and ecological harmony.

Through large-scale, distorted images of native wildflowers, the artwork evokes a sense of motion, energy, and surreal beauty—mirroring both the park's agricultural past and its evolving future as a space for community and renewal.

This vibrant design aligns with Sunnyvale's vision of Bold, Sustainable Innovation by blending natural imagery with cutting-edge materials in a joyful, inclusive, and enduring way.

# The *Regeneration*Series

The Regeneration series is inspired by native wildflowers that thrive in difficult conditions and regenerate after disruption—like California poppies blooming after wildfires.

I use the Perlin noise algorithm to alter and distort my photographic images of the flowers into swirling forms that suggest change, movement, and the delicate balance between beauty and distortion.

These visual echoes of growth and transformation are especially resonant for a public park rooted in agricultural history and reimagined as a vibrant communal space.



## Pollinators & Ecology

- To support the site's ecological goals and pollinator garden, I've incorporated bees, butterflies, and a hummingbird into the bench design. These creatures are vital to local ecosystems and represent beauty, energy, and transformation.
- Monarch butterflies, under threat from habitat loss, symbolize fragility and hope. The Anna's hummingbird is a frequent, vibrant visitor to Sunnyvale gardens, and bees—especially bumblebees—are crucial to pollination.
- These images celebrate the connection between plants and pollinators while sparking curiosity about local ecology and natural interdependence.



### Flora & Fauna

- Apricot Blossoms: Referencing Sunnyvale's agricultural roots and historic orchards.
- California Poppies: Resilient flowers that return after fire, representing healing and renewal.
- **Sky Lupine:** A vibrant local wildflower that supports pollinators.
- Douglas Iris: Adds a pop of purple and visual contrast while highlighting native biodiversity.
- **Pollinators**: add life, movement, and ecological significance.
  - Monarch butterflies
  - Bumblebees
  - Anna's hummingbird








## **Kiln-fired Art Tiles**

The the tops and sides of the bench will have imagery that is printed on high-fired porcelain tiles, using a kiln-fired process that ensures exceptional durability, vibrancy, and environmental sustainability.

### The tiles are:

- UV-resistant (guaranteed not to fade for 50 years)
- Frost- and weather-proof
- Scratch- and graffiti-resistant
- Suitable for high-traffic public spaces

These qualities align with Sunnyvale's goals for sustainability, longevity, and responsible public investment.

The detail is beautiful, and the colors are intense and saturated.








# Mosaic & Abstract Elements

The front and back surfaces of the bench feature abstract, flowing mosaics in soft, shifting hues. These patterns reflect the sky, native foliage, and changing light conditions—inviting contemplation and creating a tactile, visual experience.

Made with hand-cut ceramic and glass tiles, these subtle gradients create continuity with the printed tile designs and enhance the bench's sense of movement and harmony with nature.







# Fabrication & Experience

- As an experienced public artist, I have successfully delivered permanent installations for civic spaces, hospitals, and museums.
- I will work closely with skilled fabricators and tile installers to ensure that the bench is comfortable and built to last, and is designed in alignment with Sunnyvale's accessibility and safety standards to ensure welcoming, inclusive use by visitors of all ages and abilities.
- The design reflects the City's brand of Bold, Sustainable Innovation through its integration of art, ecology, and enduring materials.
