Inspired by a workshop with art-class students from the local O'Brien Middle School, the sculpture has two components: branches and birds. The weathering steel branches allude to the area's sagebrush and grasses, while the seven birds (that move in the wind) evoke flying geese formations that one can see in the area of the North Valleys Regional Park. The shape and color of the birds was inspired by the Mountain bluebird (*Sialia currucoides*), which is the state bird of Nevada that makes a "chur chur" sound. The birds also reference the racing planes that once flew from the nearby Stead Airport. The sculpture is intended to express a sense of aspiration, freedom, nature, and community. The sculpture's form changes depending on the viewers' position, as they drive or walk around the traffic circle.

Located in front of the new College of Education, the sculpture encapsulates ideas that are often associated with learning and education, namely transformation, illumination, and effort. To create a three-dimensional artwork that embodies the process of change and growth, a flat plane is conceptually cut and folded. As light is a universal metaphor for the acquisition and dissemination of knowledge, both sunlight and night-time illumination are incorporated into the artwork. Depending on the time of day and how sunlight hits the sculpture, the resulting light and shadow patterns created by the circular perforations on the sculpture change throughout the day. The design also creates a welcoming gathering space that is inspiring and joyful.

Located in the heart of the largest Vietnamese community in the U.S., the artwork is a contemporary re-telling of a traditional Vietnamese origins legend. The artwork conveys the hopeful story of the building of a new community from the tragedies of war. At night the

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sculpture is illuminated from within like a lantern, symbolizing the resiliency and hopes of the community. Surrounding the central sculpture are benches that showcase 100 portraits of everyday Vietnamese Americans, a collaborative project with the Vietnamese American Oral History Project of the University of California, Irvine.

Title ***Abounding in Rushes***

Yolo County is located in the Sacramento Valley area of California. Yolo comes from the Native American Patwin word "Yo-loy", which means "place abounding in rushes", a reference to the land that was once covered with wetlands. The sculpture is inspired by Native tule-reed baskets, rendered in the shape of an acorn. The sculpture is "woven" from wave-like strips of steel that contain text in Patwin, Spanish, and English expressing the Seven Values of the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation.

Located at the new Multi-generational Community Resource Center, the art plaza contains organically formed terraced seating, reminiscent of canyon walls that have been eroded over time. The mosaic paving patterns of the plaza evoke flowing, swirling water, symbolizing the meeting of different generations, cultures, peoples, memories, and hopes of the community. Shade structures, evoking clouds, have a mirror-polished finish to allow people to see reflections of themselves in the context of the community.

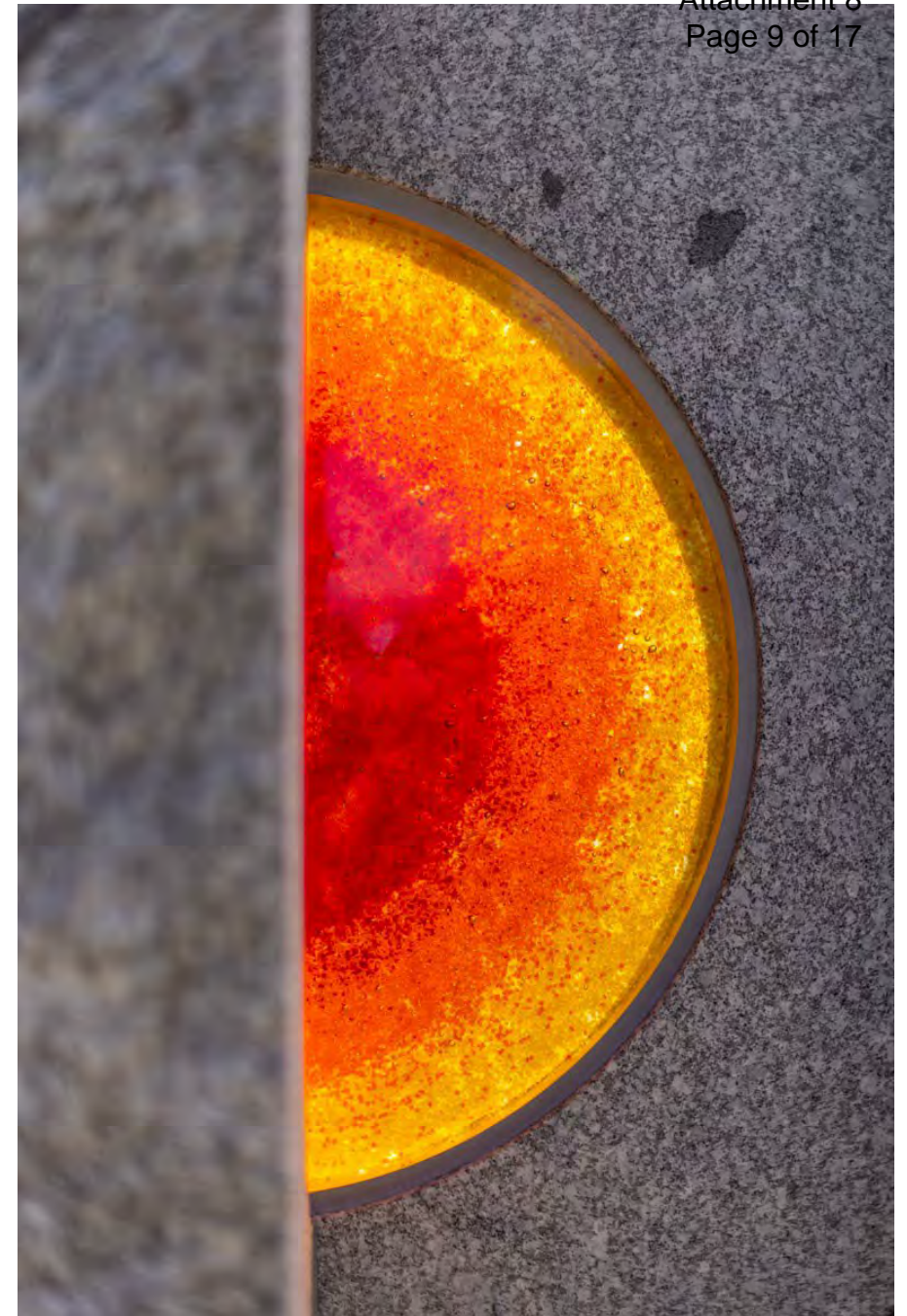
Four stone panels intersect to form a cruciform, symbolizing the earth and the corporeal body. In contradistinction, glass discs inset into the stone panels evoke an ephemeral lightness with their translucency. Their circular form symbolizes the heart and the eternal soul. Both loss and renewal are made visible through this void that captures light. The gradient of materials—from rough to smooth—creates a sense of revealing.





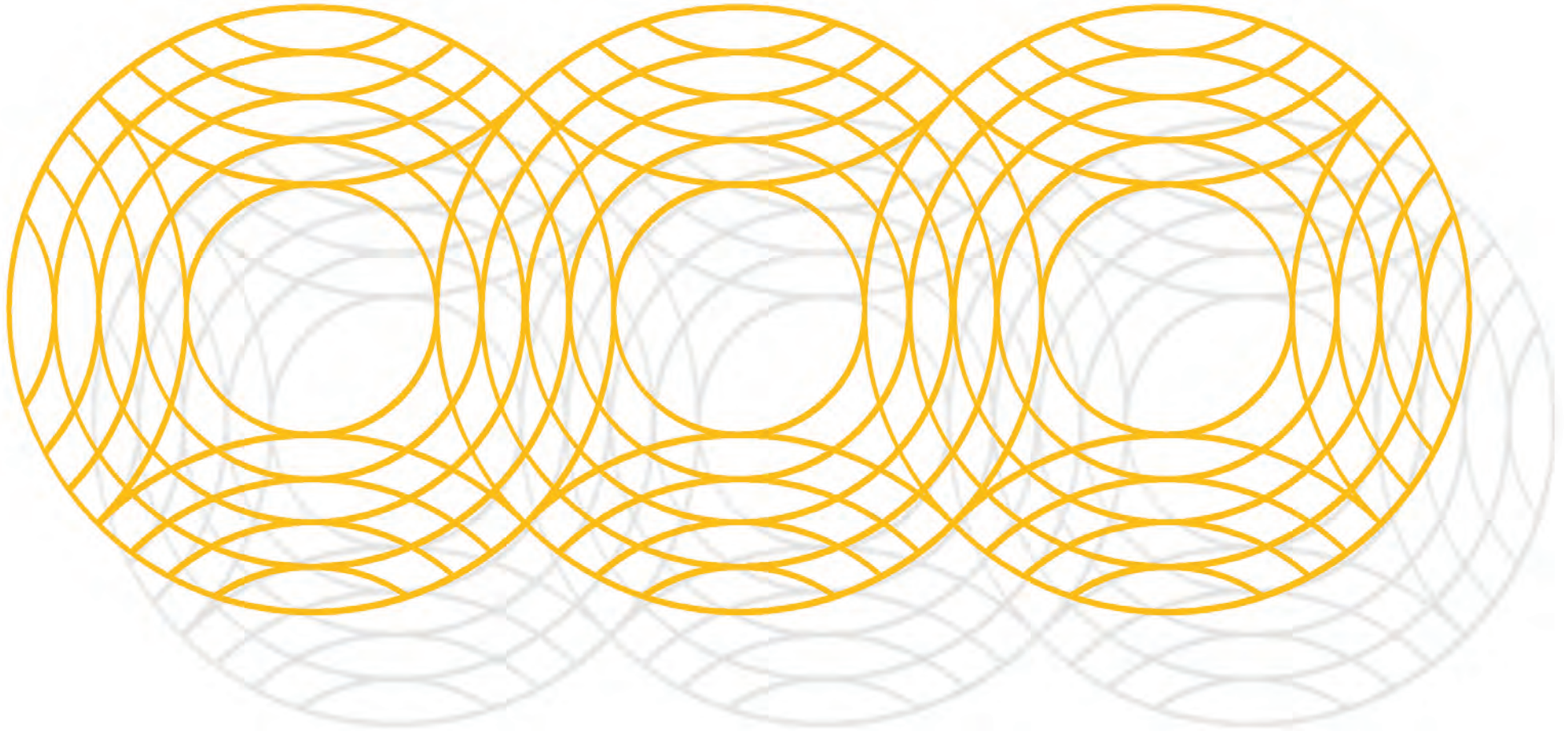

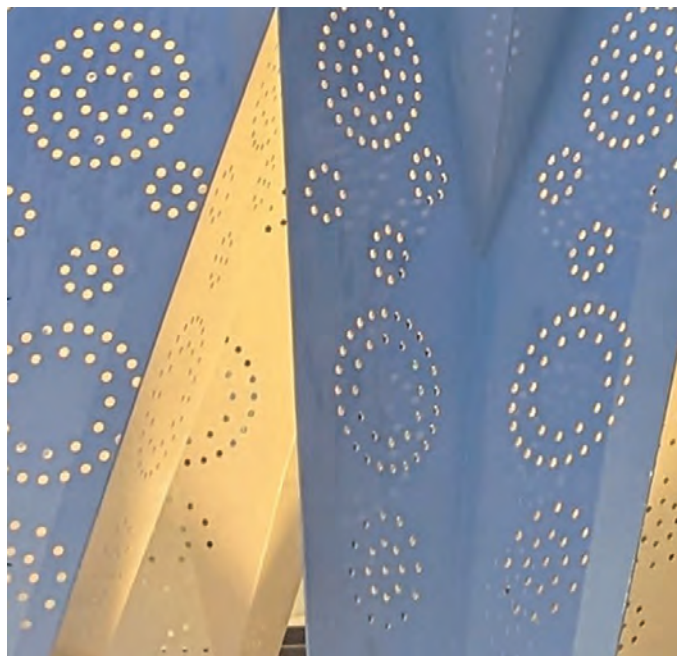
Introduction

James Dinh is a Los Angeles County–based artist and the founder of Studiofolia, a collaborative public art practice dedicated to creating site-specific works that resonate with community memory, identity, and place. With a unique background in both landscape architecture and public health, Dinh brings a multidisciplinary lens to his art.

His work centers on exploring the emotional and cultural histories of a site, translating stories into evocative visual languages that foster reflection and connection. Whether honoring collective experiences or elevating overlooked narratives, Dinh’s projects invite viewers to engage with public space in meaningful and transformative ways.

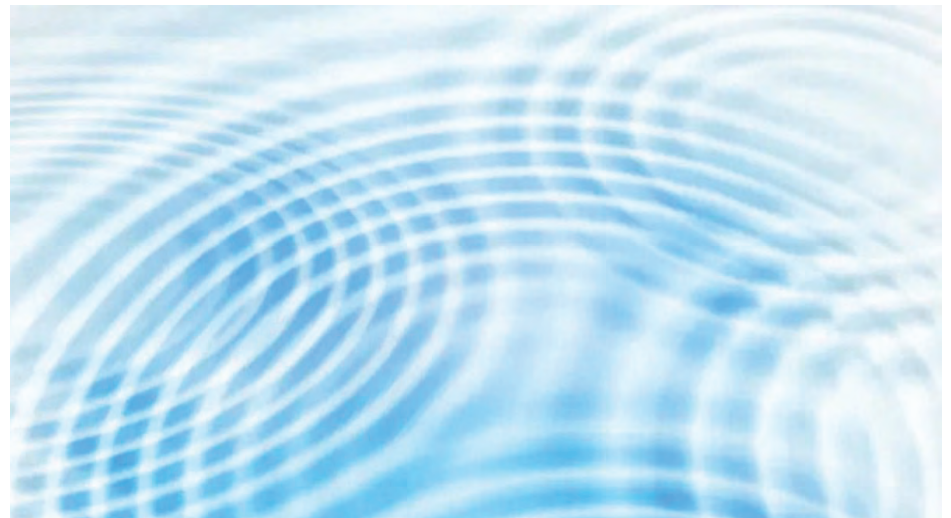


Inspiration

The artwork is based on two parallel concepts: Solar radiance (reflected in the name Plaza del Sol) and human presence as a generator of social energy.

Together, these form a unified idea: that light and community both begin from a point and expand outward.

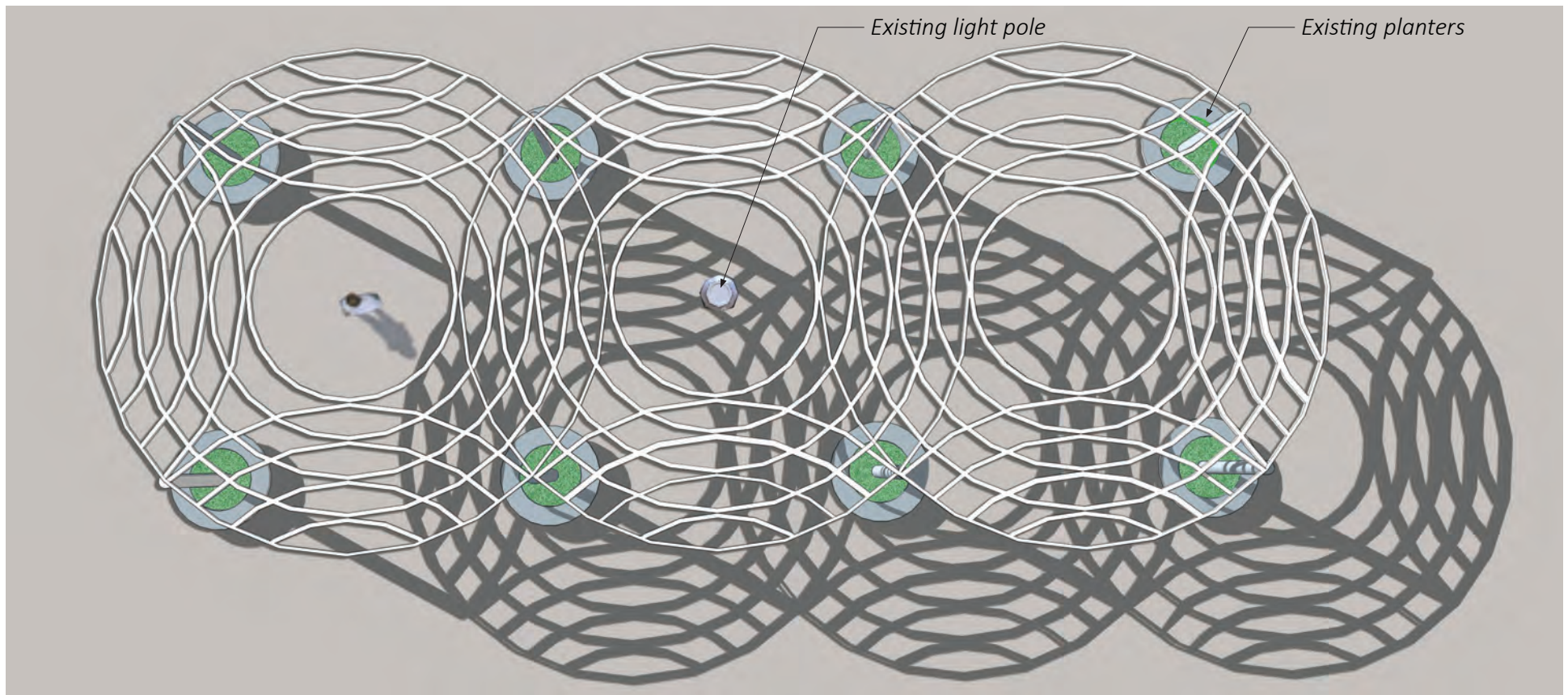
The artwork transforms the existing plaza space into a field of shared influence—where the presence of each person becomes the origin of expanding ripples of community-building connections and effects.



Design - Radiant Ripples

The artwork is composed of a series of concentric rings that overlap to form a continuous canopy of ripples. Columns anchored within the existing eight planters provide structural support. At the center of each ripple there is an opening, with the middle void incorporating the existing light pole.

When a person stands below one of these openings, they become the point of origin—the source from which the surrounding ripples extend outward. As multiple people occupy the space, their “ripples” intersect overhead. The canopy conceptually becomes a mirror of the social interactions, movements, and encounters that occur in Plaza del Sol.



Day

As the aluminum structure is open and lightweight, the areas between rings preserve views to the sky. The canopy defines space and creates shade while allowing the plaza to remain active and adaptable.



Night

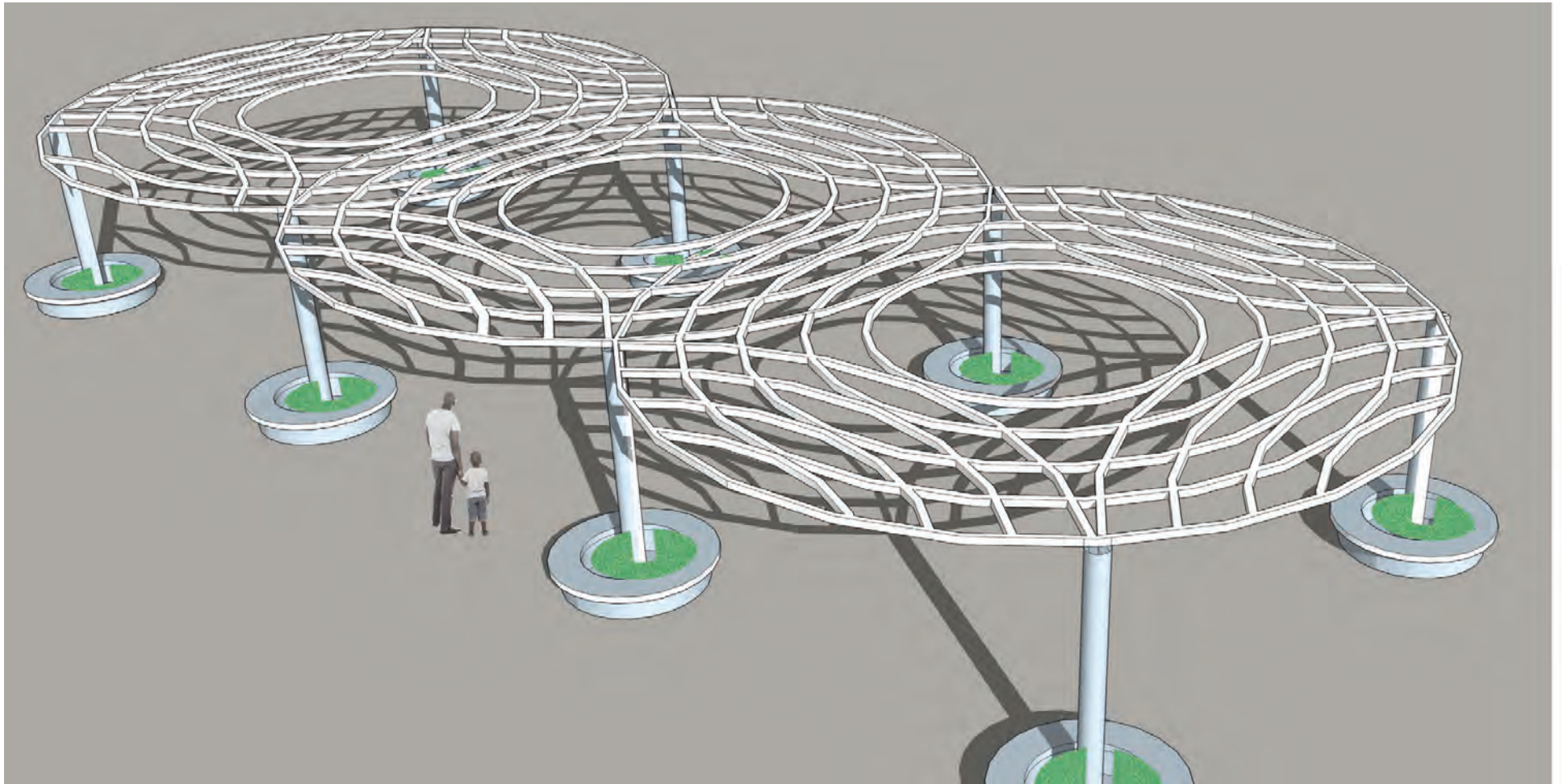
The lighting design also embodies the idea of the ripples reflecting the social interactions that occur in Plaza. Integrated within the perforated aluminum tubes are “star” lights that create a warm downward glow.

The illumination can be more concentrated near each circular center and diffuse outward, echoing both the behavior of sunlight and the way individual actions extend into the broader community.



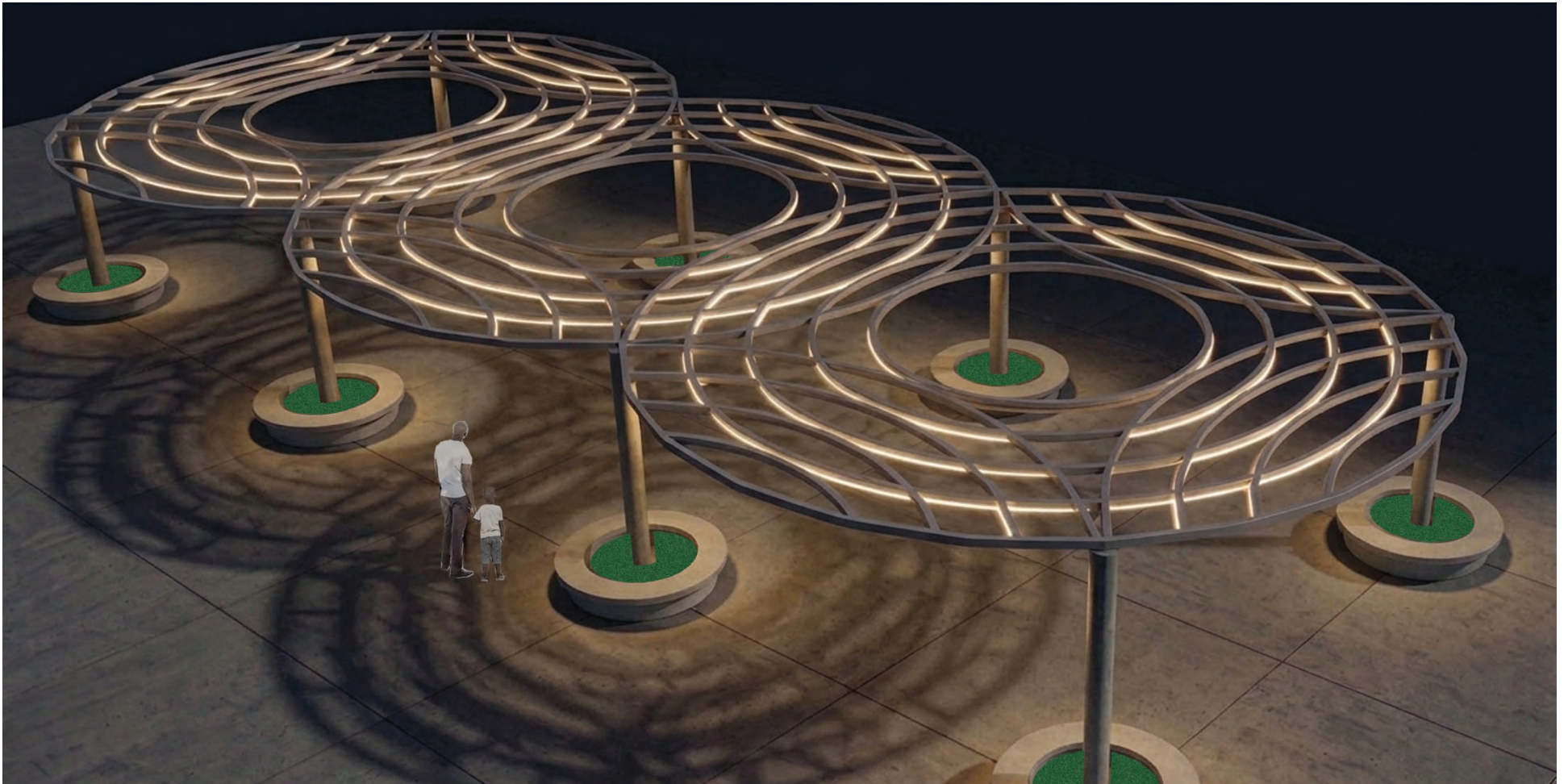
Day

During the day, the artwork reads as a delicate sculpture of lines and shadow patterns that create constantly changing visual interest.



Night

Mindful of the residences around and above the plaza, the lights will only project illumination downward.
