4 15-0003 Annual Public Hearing - Discussion of Potential Council Study Issues and Budget Issues for Calendar Year 2015

Senior Management Analyst Yvette Blackford presented the staff report.

Councilmember Meyering stated he will be sponsoring a study issue to consider use of condemnation to get control of all or a portion of the Town Center downtown project and to examine nuisance code enforcement to resolve the inappropriate conditions of Block 18.

Public hearing opened at 7:22 p.m.

Jim Reynolds, Sunnyvale Historical Society, spoke in support of a study issue regarding the relocation of the 1912 Butcher house including construction of a retaining wall between the orchard and the Heritage Museum, and provided a PowerPoint presentation.

John McManus spoke in support of a study issue for use of the parking lot at Baylands Park as a location for portable classrooms to accommodate the Spark Charter School and provided written materials.

Jeanine Stanek, Chair, Heritage Preservation Commission, spoke in support of CDD 15-07 Evaluation of the Existing Items on the Heritage Resources Inventory, CDD 14-10 Update to the Murphy Avenue Design Guidelines and CDD 15-09 Exploring Opportunities to Improve the Appearance of Public and Private Property along the 100 Block of Murphy Avenue. Stanek also spoke in support of CDD 12-02 Possible Nomination of Non-Residential Properties to the Heritage Resource Inventory.

Kevin Jackson, Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission Member speaking in support of the majority position of the commission, spoke in support of study issue DPW 15-04 Convert Part-Time Bicycle Lanes on Homestead Road to Full-Time Bicycle Lanes, DPW 15-05 Safe Bike and Pedestrian Route Maps to Schools, and DPW 15-03 Determine Steps to Move Forward to Becoming a Silver Level in the League of American Bicyclists - Bicycle Friendly Communities.

Martin Landzaat proposed study issues for an urgent care clinic in Sunnyvale, a teen center, an indoor aquatic center, and a fundraiser for naming rights to Peery Park.

Dave Jones, Chair, Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission, expressed the commission's support for DPW 15-04 Convert Part-Time Bicycle Lanes on Homestead Road to Full-Time Bicycle Lanes, CDD 15-02 Consider Multi-family Residential Transportation Demand Management Programs, DPW 15-05 Safe Bike

and Pedestrian Route Maps to Schools, DPW 15-03 Determine Steps to Move Forward to Becoming a Silver Level in the League of American Bicyclists - Bicycle Friendly Communities, and DPW 15-07 Development of a Wayfinding Signs Plan to Direct Cyclists to Bike Facilities and Important Destinations.

Public Hearing closed at 7:43 p.m.

Councilmember Whittum co-sponsored Councilmember Meyering's study issue regarding Block 18.

Councilmember Meyering co-sponsored the study issues regarding the urgent care or hospital facility in Sunnyvale, operation of a teen center and an indoor aquatic center.

Councilmember Meyering sponsored a study issue regarding selling naming rights all over the City.

Councilmember Meyering co-sponsored the study issue submitted in writing earlier regarding a revision to the downtown specific plan and green space in the downtown area.

Senior Management Analyst Blackford reported Councilmembers Meyering and Whittum have co-sponsored study issues relating to condemnation relating to the downtown including Block 18, and there are single sponsors for studying an urgent care center, an aquatic center, a teen center and naming rights for City facilities.

Councilmember Hendricks co-sponsored the study issue regarding the teen center.

Councilmember Hendricks spoke in support of looking at the retaining wall at the historical society.

Councilmember Davis co-sponsored the study issue regarding the teen center and requested the Teen Advisory Committee be involved in the study issue.

Mayor Griffith proposed a study issue regarding the impact of car sharing services on franchise taxis and whether action needs to be taken to be sure the franchises continue to have value in the City.

Councilmember Larsson co-sponsored the study issue.

Councilmember Whittum co-sponsored the study issues sponsored by Councilmember Meyering on the urgent care center and the indoor aquatic center.

**5** 15-0004

City Council 2015 Appointments to Intergovernmental and Internal Assignments, Council Subcommittees, and Community Member Appointments

Senior Management Analyst Yvette Blackford presented the staff report and noted regarding the Mayoral appointments, Mayor Griffith has taken action to reappoint all 24 2014 appointees. Senior Management Analyst Blackford stated the League of California Cities has confirmed receipt of an application from Councilmember Meyering for the Employee Relations Committee, which is not referenced in the attachment, and that Councilmember Davis has been assigned by the Cities Association to fill the primary appointment on the Executive Board for the Association of Bay Area Governments.

Amendments and corrections included:

- Vice Mayor Martin-Milius stated she is also the 2nd Vice Chair of the League of California Cities Women's Caucus.
- Councilmember Whittum clarified on Attachment 3, the name of the Ad Hoc committee regarding Lawrence Station Area Plan should be "Lawrence Station Area Plan Citizen Advisory Committee Appointment Committee" and "Review Board and Commission Bylaws" should be the "Subcommittee on Board and Commission Bylaws".
- Mayor Griffith clarified Councilmember Hendricks is the Chair of the Subcommittee on Board and Commission Bylaws.
- Councilmember Davis stated the paramedic subcomittee is not reflected on the attachment.
- Mayor Griffth reported Vice Mayor Martin-Milius will potentially be the LAFCO alternate as of Thursday, January 9 and confirmed the appointment could be tentatively ratified this evening.
- Councilmember Davis reported he applied for a position on the Board of Directors for the League of California Cities in which appointments may be made on January 23 and Mayor Griffith confirmed it should be brought back to Council for ratification at the next Council meeting if he is appointed.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: Councilmember Hendricks offered a friendly amendment to remove Councilmember Meyering's appointment from the motion. Councilmember Davis accepted the friendly amendment.

AMENDMENT: Councilmember Whittum moved to amend the motion and Councilmember Meyering seconded to add approval of the appointment of Councilmember Meyering to the League of California Cities Employee Relations Committee.

Approve the Proposed 2015 Priority Issues and Short and Long-term Legislative Advocacy Positions (LAPs)

Senior Management Analyst Yvette Blackford presented the staff report.

Public Hearing opened at 8:10 p.m.

Rani Fischer, representing 350.org, requested divesting from fossil fuel companies from the retirement fund, specifically to no longer invest in the top 200 carbon emitters and over a 5-year period to pull out from these companies.

Kevin Jackson, Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission member speaking for himself, spoke in support of divesting from fossil fuel companies.

Shelly Gordon, member of the Forest Protection Committee of the Sierra Club Loma Prieta Chapter, spoke in support for legislation to stop industrial clear-cutting.

Margaret Okuzumi, Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission member

speaking for herself, spoke in favor of the City advocating against clear-cutting and divesting from fossil fuels.

Public Hearing closed at 8:18 p.m.

MOTION: Councilmember Hendricks moved and Vice Mayor Martin-Milius seconded the motion to approve Alternative 1: Approve the Proposed 2015 Priority Issues and Legislative Advocacy Positions (Attachment 1) and Council Policy Long term Advocacy Positions as proposed to be amended (Attachment 2) as presented, and create a legislative position for the divestment of any indirect investments in fossil fuels and a legislative position against industrial clear-cutting, and state that it is the current will of the Council to have no direct investments in fossil fuels and to come back at the normal time in the Fall to formalize that position.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Councilmember Whittum moved a substitute motion and Councilmember Meyering seconded to approve the legislative advocacy policies as outlined in the staff report.

VOTE on SUBSTITUTE MOTION: 3 – 4 (Mayor Griffith, Vice Mayor Martin-Milius, Councilmembers Larsson and Hendricks dissented)

Motion failed.

VOTE on MAIN MOTION: 4 – 2 – 1 (Councilmembers Whittum and Davis dissented, Councilmember Meyering abstained)

Motion carried.

Approve Budget Modification No. 34 to Appropriate \$59,691 of Department of Homeland Security Grant Funds to Equip and Train a Regionally Deployable Public Safety Canine (K9) and Handler as an Arson/Accelerant Detection Team

#### **GRANT SUMMARY**

The City Manager applied for, and on August 20, 2014, the City was awarded Department of Homeland Security grant funds in the amount of \$59,691 for the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to equip and train a public safety K9 and its handler as an arson/accelerant detection team. The K9 will be cross-trained in protection and arson/accelerant detection. The K9 team will be a regionally deployable asset.

DPS requested this DHS State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) funding to enhance the region's capabilities to investigate arson-related fires and explosions. A K9 accelerant detection/protection K9 team is a critical resource that the Bay Area as a region currently does not have. The nearest trained teams are located in Oroville, CA to the north and Rancho Cucamonga, CA to the south. Both of these resources are owned by private companies; there are no public teams in this geographic area. This asset is critical to perform complete fire cause investigations and would enhance the Operational Area by providing Santa Clara County a much needed and unique tool to investigate acts of terrorism and related crimes. This resource will allow a faster, more efficient response, rather than waiting for such a resource to arrive at an event involving incendiary devices or fire.

The K9 arson/accelerant detection team will benefit the communities of Sunnyvale, Gilroy, Milpitas, Palo Alto, San Jose, Santa Clara, Mountain View, and Palo Alto, as well as the cities and unincorporated communities covered by the Santa Clara County Fire Department, the South Santa Clara County Fire District, and the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Department. Sunnyvale DPS plans to deploy the resource, as needed, to jurisdictions within Santa Clara County free of charge.

The total funding included here will provide the initial accelerant training and maintenance costs for the first year. Specifically:

DHS/SHSGP grants are used to address the Santa Clara County operational area's identified needs for responding to acts of terrorism or catastrophic events. Funded activities include planning, organization, equipment, training, and field exercises. Grant guidelines require each operational area to appoint an Anti-Terrorism Approval Body (known as the Approval Authority). This body makes the final determination on the operational area's allocation of SHSGP grant funds. The Approval Authority consists of the County Sheriff, County Public Health Officer or designee responsible for Emergency Medical Services, County Fire Chief or Chief Fire Authority, a Municipal Fire Chief, and a Chief of Police. The Santa Clara County Fire Chief's Association selects the municipal fire chief representative, and the Santa Clara County Police Chief's Association selects the Chief of Police representative.

The Approval Authority is assisted by the Santa Clara County Homeland Security Training & Exercise Grant Program Advisory Group (known as the Advisory Group). This group administers and allocates the training and field exercise grants. DPS annually submits requests for training, equipment, and field exercises. All requests are considered within the context of the operational area's assessed needs.

DPS' Bureau of Police Services will oversee the operational portion of the grant. The Bureau of Special Operations, Division of Strategic Services will oversee the financial management of the grant.

#### **Granting Agency**

Department of Homeland Security funds through the Santa Clara County State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP) Approval Authority

#### **EXISTING POLICY**

#### Council Policy 7.1.5 Donations, Contributions and Sponsorships:

The City Manager may apply for grants of any dollar amount, but shall notify the Council when grants are being pursued. Council approval of a budget modification to appropriate grant monies is required before funds can be expended by staff. Such a budget modification shall include the use to which the grant would be placed; the objectives or goals of the City which will be achieved through use of the grant; the local match required, if any, plus the source of the local match; any increased cost to be locally funded upon termination of the grant; and the ability of the City to administer the grant. For grants under the amount of \$5,000 that do not have any external reporting requirements or any local match requirement, Council approval of a budget modification is not required. The City Manager is authorized to accept and administratively appropriate the grant funds.

This grant does not meet all of the criteria to be administratively appropriated by the City Manager; therefore a budget modification is required. Grant funds from DHS have external reporting requirements and fall under the federal single audit guidelines.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

This activity does not require environmental review because it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that it may have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3).

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

Expenditures for the arson/accelerant detecting training, equipment, and supplies, a SHSGP-approved project, are reimbursable up to a cumulative total of \$59,691. The grant covers the cost of the training tuition for the K9 and its handler, the handler's overtime and associated backfill, training equipment, and supplies.

K9s have a working life of approximately 5 years. DPS currently has four (4) K9s, with one (1) retiring in early 2015. DPS will seek other funding sources, including donations, to replace the K9. The replacement cost includes the cost of the K9 and all associated training for it and its handler to become a protection K9 team. This same K9 team will be cross-trained as an arson/accelerant detection team. The grant covers this supplemental arson/accelerant training and associated costs.

#### Required Local Match

None

#### Increased Cost To City Upon Grant Termination

Because this K9 will replace an existing K9, ongoing costs are already included in the Department of Public Safety's operating budget.

#### **REPORT IN BRIEF**

Approval is requested to award a contract to Turf Star of Hayward in the amount of \$96,033 excluding sales tax, for one self-propelled mower for use by the Department of Public Works.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

N/A

#### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION**

The City has 2 industrial riding mowers which are used on a daily basis to maintain City parks and golf courses; one is a Jacobsen and the other is a Toro. Jacobsen and Toro are the only two known manufacturers of this type of riding mower. The Toro mower currently in use is seven years old with over 3,000 hours of operation and at the end of its useful life. Replacement at this time is recommended, with budgeted funds set aside for this purpose during FY 2014/2015. The proposed replacement mower is a Toro model 5910.

Though the Jacobsen riding mowers tend to be less expensive than the Toro models, the latter has proven to be the most cost effective for the City, especially in terms of fuel economy, and lower downtime records and maintenance costs. In fact, since the City purchased a Jacobsen model in late 2012, the unit has required service twenty times vs. ten repairs for the Toro (which is several years older). Additionally, staff has found that the Toro representatives are very responsive to the City's service requests. Finally, Parks and Fleet staff have significant experience operating and maintaining the Toro mowers.

Staff therefore recommends awarding a contract to Turf Star, which is Toro's sole regional distributor. Turf Star has offered pricing for this mower through the National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance (IPA), a multi-state purchasing cooperative awarded a master contract by Tucson, Arizona. National cooperatives such as these can typically leverage volume pricing, and in this case a 22% discount from the list price was obtained. Use of another entity's contract for this type of procurement is allowable under Section 2.08.220 of the Sunnyvale Municipal Code.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The total purchase price of the new unit, excluding sales tax is \$96,033. Budgeted funds are available in the Fleet Equipment Replacement Account.

#### **SUBJECT**

Award of Contracts for the Purchase of Vehicle Fuel Based on Cooperative Reverse Auction (F15-44)

#### **REPORT IN BRIEF**

Approval is requested to award three-year contracts, not to exceed budgeted amounts, to Valley Oil Company, Southern Counties Oil Company dba SC Fuels (SC Fuels), Golden Gate Petroleum, and Mansfield Oil Company for unleaded and diesel fuel, and to authorized the City Manager to renew the contracts for two additional one-year periods if pricing and service remain acceptable to the City. The total cost over the three year period is not anticipated to exceed \$2.6 million, based on current operating budget assumptions.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

N/A

#### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION**

Most of the City's fleet of vehicles is powered by diesel and unleaded gasoline. The fuel is stored in underground tanks at various locations in the City and is monitored by Central Stores staff. The City's current contracts for fuel were awarded as a result of the County of Santa Clara's cooperative, multiagency bid solicitation in November, 2009, the contract period for which expires January 31, 2015. In August 2014 the City of Sunnyvale accepted the County's invitation to again participate in a cooperative purchase solicitation for delivery of bulk fuel.

The County of Santa Clara's procurement method for fuel was through online reverse auctions conducted by BidSync, one of the leading providers of online auction services. This type of auction takes place in real time, and both the buyer and seller can see each bid as it is placed. Auctions are commonly scheduled for one half hour; if a last minute bid is received, the auction is automatically extended for an additional five minutes to allow thoughtful reaction by other bidders. Participating agencies included the Counties of Santa Clara and Alameda, the Santa Clara County Fire Department, the Alameda-Contra Costa Transit District, the East Bay Regional Park District, and the Cities of Belmont, Gilroy, Oakland, Pleasanton, San Leandro, Santa Clara, and Sunnyvale. The combined estimated purchase volume is 3,802,643 gallons of unleaded gasoline and 6,164,041 gallons of diesel fuel.

The reverse auction for unleaded gasoline was held on October 27, 2014. The base price for each lot is the Oil Price Information Service (OPIS) San Jose Daily Contract Average Rack benchmark price. This price is the average of all supplier prices in the San Jose fuel market, taken at a specified time each day. The low bidders for the City's unleaded gasoline requirements were Valley Oil Company for lots of up to 1,500 gallons (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.1889 above Oil Price Information Service

(OPIS) San Jose, and for lots of up to 6,000 gallons (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.045 above OPIS San Jose; and SC Fuels for lots of 6,001 gallons or more (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.0373 below OPIS San Jose. Bid results are shown in Attachment 1.

The reverse auction for diesel fuel was held on October 28, 2014. The low bidders for the City's diesel fuel requirements were Golden Gate Petroleum for lots of up to 1,500 gallons (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.17 above OPIS San Jose and for lots of up to 6,000 gallons (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.075 above OPIS San Jose; and Mansfield Oil Company for lots of 6,001 gallons or more (per delivery) with a bid of \$0.0004 below OPIS San Jose. Bid results are shown in Attachment 2.

For bidding purposes, a base price of \$3.00 per gallon was used for uniformity to enable fair comparisons among bids (the bid results shown in Attachments 1 and 2 show dollar values above and below \$3.00, depending on order quantity). However, the City will pay the bid prices above or below the OPIS San Jose Average Rack price on the day the fuel is ordered. For example, if the OPIS Rack price for unleaded fuel is \$2.90 per gallon at the time of order, and the City orders more than 6,001 gallons from SC Fuels (whose low bid was \$0.0373 below OPIS for this quantity), then the per gallon pricing would be \$2.8627.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

In Fiscal Year 2014/2015, approximately \$854,000 is budgeted for the purchase of vehicle fuel in Department of Public Works Operating Program 763 (Provision of Vehicles and Motorized Equipment). Anticipated increases of 2% and 3% for the following two fiscal years are included in the operating budget. Consistent with the planned budget, the overall total of the three-year agreements is not anticipated to exceed \$2.6 million, as follows:

A primary contract for unleaded fuel will be established with SC Fuels at approximately \$1.6 million over the three-year period. A backup contract will be established with Valley Oil in the approximate amount of \$200,000. Contracts for diesel fuel will be established with Golden Gate Petroleum and Mansfield Oil Company in approximate equal amounts of \$400,000. Based on actual usage, these estimated amounts may be modified up or down per contract during the contract period within the overall budget.

#### PUBLIC CONTACT

Public contact was made by posting the Council agenda on the City's official-notice bulletin board outside City Hall, at the Sunnyvale Senior Center, Community Center and Department of Public Safety; and by making the agenda and report available at the Sunnyvale Public Library, the Office of the City Clerk and on the City's website.

#### RECOMMENDATION

1) Award three-year contracts based upon the County of Santa Clara's cooperative reverse auction bid to Valley Oil Company and SC Fuels for unleaded gasoline, and to Golden Gate Petroleum and Mansfield Oil Company for diesel fuel, in substantially the same form as the draft blanket purchase orders attached to the report, not to exceed budgeted amounts; and 2) Authorize the City Manager to renew the contracts for two additional one-year periods, not to exceed budgeted amounts, provided that pricing and service remain acceptable to the City.

#### REPORT IN BRIEF

Approval is requested to award a contract to Dell Computer in the amount of \$145,935, excluding taxes, for one hundred eighteen (118) computers to be used throughout the City as assigned by the Department of Information Technology.

#### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION**

This purchase is for the combined replacement of 118 desktop and laptop computers City-wide. The current computers have reached end of life, which is typically five years, and are no longer supported by the vendor. It is neither possible to consistently obtain parts for the aged equipment nor economically feasible to continue to support the existing computers.

Information Technology (IT) staff has determined that the acquisition of Dell computers for City staff use is the best option because it aligns with the strategic direction to standardize hardware platforms to ensure compatibility and integration with existing equipment. Currently, the City uses Dell desktops and laptops, Dell Blade Servers for the virtual server environment and Dell/Kace KBOX for the Service Request and Desktop Management system.

It is recommended that the City utilize the current Western States Contracting Alliance (WSCA) Master Price Agreement to purchase the computers. WSCA provides the most up to date prenegotiated discount pricing for hardware and software and is used extensively by local and state government. This type of purchase is allowable under Section 2.08.220(b) of the Sunnyvale Municipal Code (Use of Another Entity's Contract).

#### **SUBJECT**

Modify an Existing Contract for Street Tree Maintenance Services

#### REPORT IN BRIEF

Approval is requested to amend an existing 30-month contract with West Coast Arborists by increasing the maximum dollar amount by \$438,000, from \$1,221,175 to \$1,659,175. Available funding for this amendment is budgeted in operating program 219 (Street Tree Services).

#### BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Starting in 2001, tree trimming cycles had been growing, reaching a high of twelve and a half years in 2010. The FY 2012/13 Adopted Budget included restoration of a seven-year cycle for structural pruning of the City's 37,000 street trees. In January 2013, Council awarded a 30-month contract in the amount of \$1,221,175 to West Coast Arborists (RTC 13-011), to provide for contracted street tree maintenance services. The contract encompasses two and one-half fiscal years, through FY 2014/15, and was set based on estimates at the time to restore the seven-year structural pruning cycle.

In FY 2013/14, the City was able to utilize the contractor to provide preventive maintenance pruning to over 12,000 street trees. This set a pace that, if continued, will allow the City to restore pruning back to a seven year cycle. As the work done under this contract was completed at an accelerated pace, expenditures exceeded the contract limit. While within the program's budget, the contract amount needs to be amended to reflect the current work. Staff recommends that the contract maximum be increased by \$438,000 through the term ending June 30, 2015, which will cover pruning work already incurred of \$187,873, as well as work anticipated through the end of FY 2014/15. To avoid any future expenditures outside of approved contract funds, Parks staff is implementing an internal process that requires closely monitoring each encumbrance and comparing expenses to the budget and contract amount.

Staff Comments to the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority on the Draft Environmental Impact Report of the El Camino Real Bus Rapid Transit Project

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) has completed the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) of a San Jose to Palo Alto Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project in Sunnyvale via El Camino Real. This project is the result of a VTA Countywide evaluation of potential BRT corridors that found the El Camino Real corridor to be a high priority for development. VTA retained a consulting firm, and over the last few years, analyzed civil engineering requirements, traffic impacts, urban design considerations, operations and ridership, compatibility with local plans and policies, and pedestrian and bicycle concerns. The VTA has also conducted public outreach, including a Sunnyvale Council study session on November 11, 2014.

The VTA studied multiple alternatives for BRT service on El Camino Real including dedicated busonly lanes and mixed-flow lanes (the bus shares the lane with motor vehicles). The bus-only lane alternative reduces El Camino Real to four lanes while the mixed-flow alternative maintains the current six travel lanes. Throughout the process staff has given guidance to the VTA on consistency with related City policies and commented on design guidelines and technical studies. The DEIR considered seven alternatives; these alternatives are shown in Figure ES-3 of the Executive Summary (Attachment 1). Two project scenarios have been studied, a near term (2018) and a long term (2040).

#### **EXISTING POLICY**

Legislative Advocacy Position 1.1 (1) Monitor the El Camino Real Bus Rapid Transit project conceptual engineering and environmental analysis to ensure that the City's interests are addressed.

The Land Use and Transportation Element of the General Plan contains goals and policies that are generally applicable to bus transit but not specifically the Bus Rapid Transit project. These goals and policies include:

- Goal LT-1: Protect and sustain a high quality of life in Sunnyvale by participating in coordinated land use and transportation planning in the region.
  - Policy LT-1.1: Advocate the City's interests to regional agencies that make land use and transportation system decisions that affect Sunnyvale.
  - o Policy LT-1.2 Support coordinated regional transportation planning and improvements.
  - Policy LT-1.8: Support statewide, regional and sub-regional efforts that provide for an effective transportation system.

- Policy LT-1.9: Support flexible and appropriate alternative transportation modes and transportation system management measures that reduce reliance on the automobile and serve changing regional and citywide land use and transportation needs.
- Goal LT-5: Attain a transportation system that is effective, safe, pleasant and convenient.
  - Policy LT-5.5: Support a variety of transportation modes.
  - Policy LT-5.6: Minimize expansion of the current roadway system, while maximizing opportunities for alternative transportation systems and related programs.
  - Policy LT-5.11: All modes of transportation shall have safe access to city streets.

The Precise Plan for El Camino Real also includes long-range goals that are relevant but are not specific to the Bus Rapid Transit project:

- Goal 3.2.3: Maintain and enhance the capacity of the street to accommodate automobile and transit traffic, while providing improved facilities for bicyclists and pedestrians.
- Goal 3.2.5: Design, develop and maintain the public right-of-way in a manner which creates a strong, positive image of the city of Sunnyvale for both residents and visitors.
- Goal 3.2.8: Encourage development which supports the use of public transit.

#### **DISCUSSION**

In 2012 VTA initiated the analysis of seven alternatives, resulting in the release of the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) on October 29, 2014 (the report can be found here: <a href="http://www.vta.org/Projects-and-Programs/Transit/El-Camino-Real-Draft-Environmental-Impact-ReportEnvironmental-Analysis">http://www.vta.org/Projects-and-Programs/Transit/El-Camino-Real-Draft-Environmental-Impact-ReportEnvironmental-Analysis</a>). Upon release of the DEIR, the public and public agencies were given the opportunity to comment on the document; the public comment period closes at 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 14, 2015.

The DEIR describes project alternatives, existing environmental setting, and potential impacts from the construction and operation of BRT. Where impacts are identified, mitigation measures are recommended to alleviate project impacts. Staff from Public Works, Community Development, and Economic Development reviewed the DEIR and are providing comments for consideration. At this time City staff is not making a recommendation on a preferred alternative, but is requesting additional analysis or clarification to assure that all required information is available. VTA will prepare a response to comments and complete the Final EIR. After the Final EIR is completed, staff expects to come back to Council to determine if the City will support either the dedicated lane or mixed flow alternative in Sunnyvale.

The comment letter that will be mailed to VTA is Attachment 2 of this report. The comment letter is due by Wednesday January 14, and no additional changes or comments are expected unless a (1) fatal flaw is identified in the analysis or (2) Council would like to provide specific policy direction. Below is a bullet point summary of the key areas identified by staff as part of its review:

- Concerns over diverted traffic and additional congestion within Sunnyvale
- Operational concerns due to removal of left turns on El Camino
- Parking needs along the corridor
- Sunnyvale specific transit ridership data

Station locations, aesthetics, and trees

VTA's response to the City's comments and concerns will provide the City the best available information to make a decision on the project. However the City's support on an alternative will ultimately be a policy decision that will value the loss of two travel lanes on El Camino which will reduce vehicular capacity, increase congestion, and decrease vehicular access to the benefits of a more enhanced transit system and increased transit ridership.

Public contact was made by posting the Council agenda on the City's official-notice bulletin board outside City Hall, at the Sunnyvale Senior Center, Community Center and Department of Public Safety; and by making the agenda and report available at the Sunnyvale Public Library, the Office of the City Clerk and on the City's website.

# **Executive Summary**

## **ES.1** Introduction

The Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA), in cooperation with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), proposes to implement bus rapid transit (BRT) improvements along a 17.6-mile stretch of El Camino Real, The Alameda, and West Santa Clara Street. This chapter provides a brief summary of the Project location, Project history, purpose and need for the Project, the Project alternatives, a summary of potential environmental impacts, and proposed mitigation measures. This summary should not be relied upon for a thorough understanding of these topics. For comprehensive analysis, refer to the applicable sections in the Draft Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Assessment (EIR/EA) and the appendices.

# **ES.2** Project Location

The El Camino Real BRT Project (Project) is proposed in Santa Clara County in the cities of San José, Santa Clara, Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Los Altos, and Palo Alto (see Figure ES-1). The Project would be primarily located along El Camino Real, a state-owned route (State Route [SR] 82) under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) (Project corridor). In San José, the Project corridor is located on West Santa Clara Street and The Alameda; these streets are under the jurisdiction of the City of San José. Together, West Santa Clara Street, The Alameda and El Camino Real compose the Project corridor. The Project corridor is a four-lane east-west road in San José and a six-lane road from Santa Clara to Palo Alto (see Figure ES-2). The eastern terminus is located at the Arena in downtown San José, and the western terminus is located at the Palo Alto Transit Center in downtown Palo Alto.

El Camino Real is a major transportation corridor that intersects many local streets and other transportation corridors. Regional access to El Camino Real is provided by major intersecting routes including Interstate (I-) 880 in San José, San Tomas Expressway and Lawrence Expressway in Santa Clara, SR 85 and SR 237 in Mountain View, and Page Mill Road/Oregon Expressway in Palo Alto. The Project corridor runs parallel to and between U.S. Highway 101 (U.S. 101) (to the northeast) and I-280 (to the southwest).

# **ES.3** Project History

El Camino Real is one of the main thoroughfares through Santa Clara County. Communities along The Alameda and El Camino Real have adopted many land use and capital

improvement plans to aid its development over the years. The 2009 Bus Rapid Transit Strategic Plan prepared by VTA identified El Camino Real as a promising alignment for BRT in the near-term. The Grand Boulevard Initiative (GBI) vision was adopted in 2007 by the GBI Task Force to help realize the full potential of the El Camino Real "for housing and urban development, balancing the need for cars and parking with viable options for transit, walking and biking." In addition, the Valley Transportation Plan 2035, a countywide transportation plan for Santa Clara County adopted in January 2009, identifies the programs, projects, and policies VTA's Board of Directors would like to implement over the next 25 years, including along the Project corridor. The Valley Transportation Plan 2035 is not a programming document but does provide a planning and policy framework for developing and delivering future transportation projects for the program area. The Project is included in the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC) financially constrained long range plan (regional transportation plan [RTP]), *Plan Bay Area* at a \$233.7M funding level. Plan Bay Area's transportation element specifies how \$292 billion in anticipated federal, state, and local funds will be spent through 2040.

As described in Section 4.3, *Air Quality and Greenhouse Gas Emissions*, the Project would contribute to the MTC's and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District's goals to improve long-term air quality and support alternate modes of transportation, as described in the MTC's *Plan Bay Area*, and other air quality management documents. The regional conformity analysis for Plan Bay Area and the 2013 TIP were adopted by MTC on July 18, 2013 and approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)/FTA on August 12, 2013. MTC released the Draft 2015 TIP and associated regional conformity analysis on July 31, 2014. FHWA and FTA area expected to approve the final analyses in December 2014. Upon selection of a preferred alternative, VTA will consult with MTC on the need for an amendment to *Plan Bay Area* to ensure the Project's scope, design, and opening year are consistent with MTC's current regional conformity analysis. In May 2014, the Project was determined by the Air Quality Conformity Task Force<sup>1</sup> to not be a project of air quality concern as defined by 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 93.123(b)(1) or 40 CFR 93.128, and therefore a PM hotspot analysis is not required (Appendix F).

Beginning in early 2011, VTA conducted more than 20 meetings with cities, organizations, and the public to specifically discuss the Project and collect feedback. Concurrently, VTA has been collecting transportation and land use information and preparing technical analyses to assess the feasibility of implementing the Project. Based on the technical analysis performed to date and public input, VTA has developed four alternatives (specifically, Alternatives 1, 2, 3, and 4), which are discussed in detail in Chapter 3, *Alternatives*.

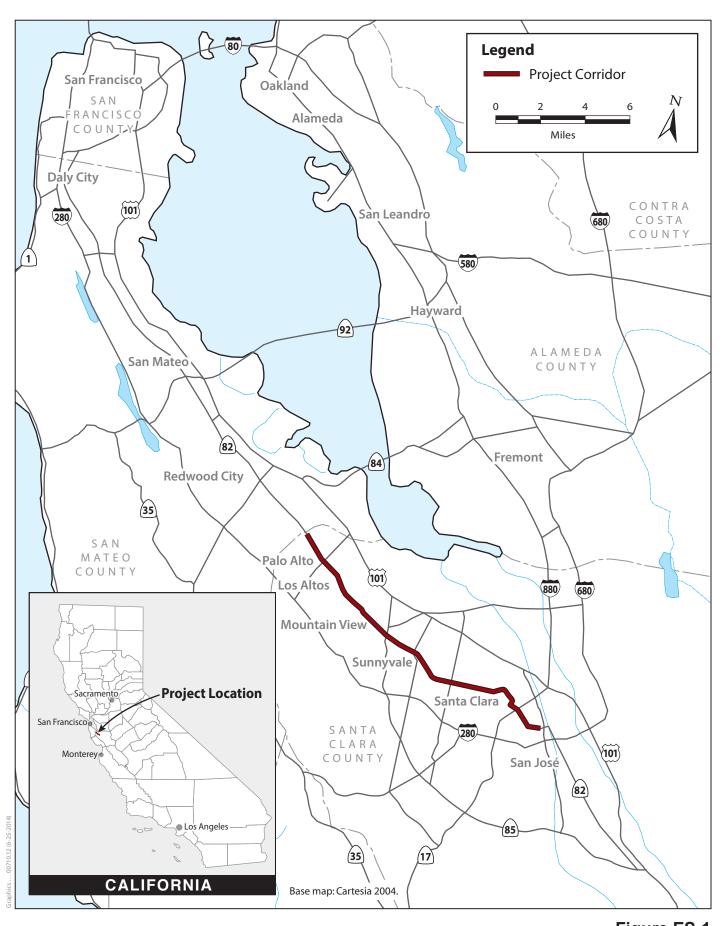


Figure ES-1

El Camino Real Bus Rapid Transit Project

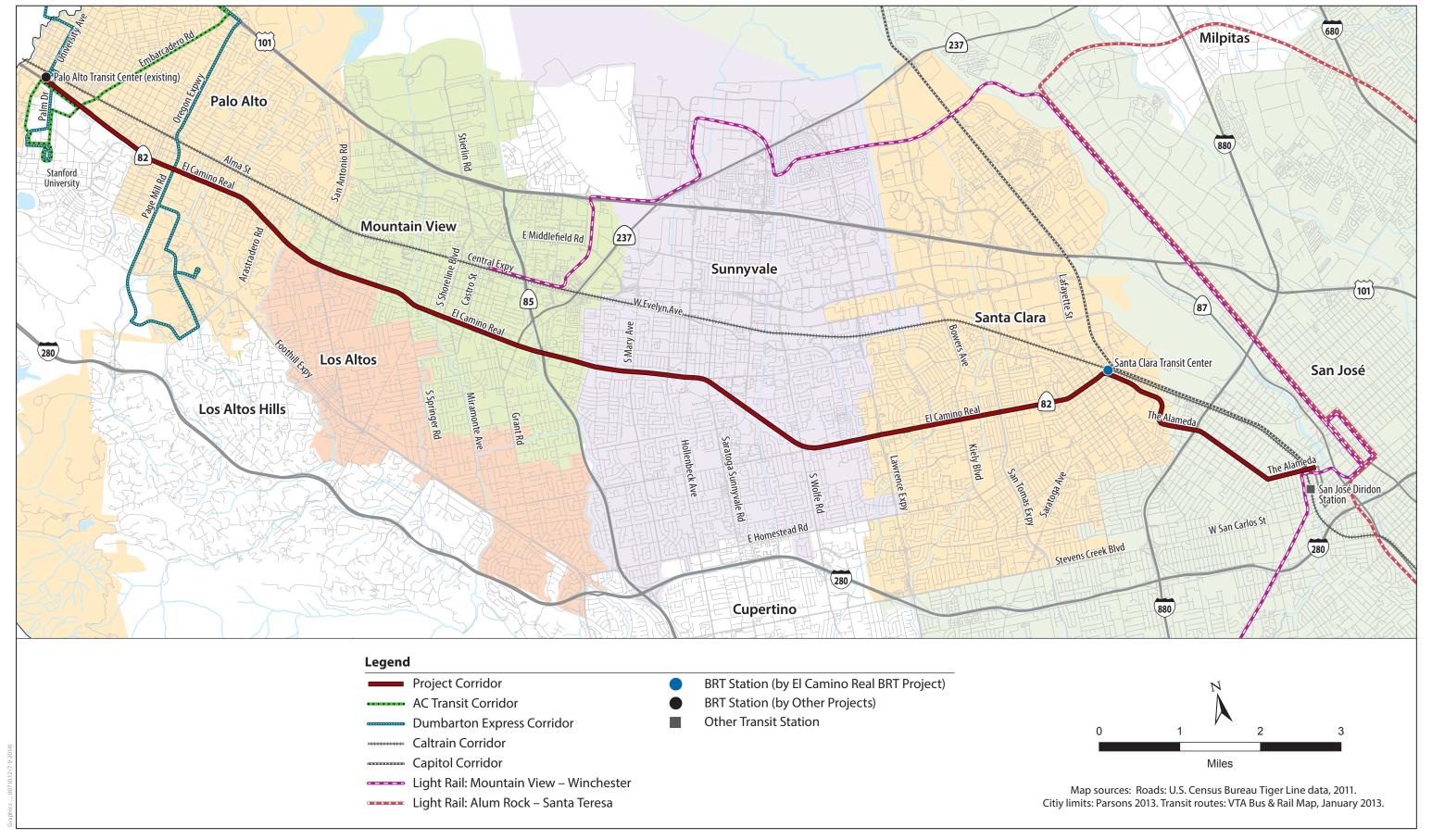


Figure ES-2

## **ES.4** Project Purpose and Need

El Camino Real is an important arterial in Santa Clara County and on the San Francisco Peninsula. However, El Camino Real is predominantly auto-oriented, and streetscape amenities are limited. There are widespread concerns regarding congestion, appearance, and safety, and a general public perception exists that the corridor is not well planned. Exacerbating current conditions, Santa Clara County is expected to experience substantial growth in the next 30 years from 2010 to 2040. If no improvements are implemented, heavy demand will potentially be placed on the existing transportation infrastructure, which is planned to increase by only 5 to 6 percent.

The purpose of this Project is to:

- Provide a competitive transit alternative to the automobile in the Project corridor.
- Increase the reliability, frequency, and travel speed of transit along the Project corridor.
- Improve transit amenities and facilities to provide greater comfort and safety.
- Enhance the multi-modal character of El Camino Real with street improvements for pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Provide the transit infrastructure to support the implementation of the transit goals and objectives of the Grand Boulevard Initiative (for El Camino Real).
- Provide the transit infrastructure to support city general and specific plans that call for a greater role for transit to complement their growth strategies.
- Improve efficiency and cost-effectiveness of transit services in the Project corridor.

Project need is demonstrated by the following factors.

- Anticipated population and employment growth.
- Projected increase in transit demand.
- Projected increases in transit travel times and decreases in travel speeds.
- Declines in transit performance and reliability.
- Lack of transit rider amenities and poor streetscape conditions.
- Insufficient transit infrastructure to support regional and local planning intensification policies.

The Project's purpose and need is discussed in greater detail in in Chapter 2, *Purpose and Need*.

## **ES.4.1** Project Description

The Project would provide BRT service along West Santa Clara Street, The Alameda, and El Camino Real in Santa Clara County from the Arena in downtown San José to the Palo Alto Transit Center in downtown Palo Alto. BRT features and Project Alternatives considered in this EIR/EA are described in the following sections.

#### ES.4.1.1 BRT Definition

BRT is defined as a high-quality, high-speed for of bus transit that provides services and amenities similar to light rail but at a much lower cost. BRT uses specialized vehicles that operate on city streets and in dedicated lanes, similar to light rail fixed guideway. Overall BRT is designed to improve the speed, reliability, and identity of bus transit by offering frequent, limited-stop service.

## **ES.4.1.2** Project Features

The Project would help the predominantly auto-oriented El Camino Real corridor transition to a multi-modal transit area. All of the Build Alternatives would be constructed and operated entirely within the existing street right-of-way. None of the alternatives includes property acquisitions. Features included in each Build Alternative together propose to create rapid and reliable transit service for the benefit of passengers along the Project corridor, and the transit system as a whole. The El Camino BRT Project (refer to Chapter 3, *Alternatives* for a comprehensive description of features) would include the following features.

- **BRT vehicles.** To clearly differentiate BRT services from local or other bus transit services, VTA would use distinctive vehicles and specialized branding to call out the BRT service as unique, innovative, and distinctive.
- All-door boarding. Primary fare collection would be through the ticket vending machines, which would allow passengers to board through all three doors of the 60-foot articulated bus instead of through only the front door to pay at a fare box. All-door boarding means that boarding times would be substantially shortened.
- **Transit signals.** Additional transit signal priority (TSP) infrastructure would be provided throughout the Project corridor at signals in segments that do not currently have TSP.
- Stations. New BRT stations would be equipped with enhanced amenities similar to VTA's light rail stations. The BRT stations would have larger and more elaborate canopies (over waiting areas and seating) with real-time passenger information displays showing next arrivals for each route and public address speakers to announce arrivals. Way-finding information, trash receptacles, ticket vending machines, Clipper<sup>TM</sup> card readers, emergency call boxes, and closed circuit television cameras would also be included at station locations.
- **Parking.** Curbside parking would be maintained to the extent possible, although some loss of street parking would result under each of the Build Alternatives. Dedicated lane segments would include bicycle lanes in place of parking. Refer to Section 4.12, *Transportation and Traffic* for more information on parking.

## **ES.4.1.3** Project Alternatives

Based on the results of the screening process for the 2009 BRT Strategic Plan and public input received during the 2013 public scoping meetings, four Project alternatives were developed and recommended for analysis under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). These four alternatives consist

of a No Build Alternative (Alternative 1) and three Build Alternatives (Alternatives 2, 3, and 4). Alternatives 3 and 4 also include design options (see Figure ES-3). The Build Alternatives would replace Bus Route Rapid 522 and potentially affect ridership of Bus Route Local 22.

Each Build Alternative includes mixed-flow lanes (lanes for all vehicular travel) and curbside bulbout stations in San José. Where the BRT operates in mixed-flow lanes, typically the existing curbside bus stop would be removed and replaced with new BRT stations to be used by both BRT and local buses. Where dedicated lanes would be constructed, the existing bus stops would be maintained for local bus services, and the Build Alternatives would remove a general travel lane in each direction for dedicated bus use and build new BRT stations in the median. Both the short and long dedicated lane (lanes for exclusive use of BRT and emergency vehicles) alternatives (Alternatives 3 and 4, respectively) incorporate dedicated lanes through Santa Clara. The long dedicated lane alternative considers transitions to mixed-flow lanes at different locations along the Project corridor, specifically at SR 85 in Mountain View, Showers Drive in Mountain View, and Embarcadero Road in Palo Alto.

All Project buses would terminate at the Palo Alto Transit Center, the west end of the Project corridor, allowing for transfer to other bus lines and transportation modes. Under all of the Build Alternatives, the western end of the BRT route between Embarcadero Road and the Palo Alto Transit Center would be a mixed-flow configuration to allow BRT vehicles room to weave safely across one or two lanes of traffic to turn on University Avenue and access the Palo Alto Transit Center.

#### Alternative 1: No Build

Alternative 1, the No Build Alternative, would only include improvements that are planned to occur regardless of whether BRT is implemented. Local bus route 22 would continue to run in the El Camino Real corridor. Diesel buses that provide Rapid 522 service (currently providing limited-stop bus service in the Project corridor) would be replaced in 2015 by BRT hybrid diesel-electric buses, but the BRT buses would not provide BRT service. The BRT buses, instituted under the Santa Clara-Alum Rock BRT Project, would operate on 10-minute headways, providing an increase in service along the corridor from the current four buses per hour to six buses per hour. The Local 22 bus service (currently and in the future providing all-stop service in the Project corridor) would operate at 15-minute headways. Under Alternative 1, there would be no BRT station improvements and no off-board fare collection.

#### Alternative 2: All Mixed Flow from San José to Palo Alto

Alternative 2 would provide all mixed flow from San José to Palo Alto with no dedicated bus lane for the entire 17.6-mile corridor. Curbside bulbout stations would be developed along the corridor (three stations in San José, four stations in Santa Clara, four stations in Sunnyvale, one station in Mountain View, one station in Los Altos, and two stations in Palo Alto). Existing pork-chop islands (pedestrian islands separated from the sidewalk by a right turn lane) would be removed and existing curbs would be extended to make smaller intersections in many locations. VTA would restripe the crosswalks for these intersections. In

Palo Alto, restriping would occur on Embarcadero Road to allow for buses to pass traffic to ensure that they are first in line at the traffic signal.

#### **Alternative 3: Short Dedicated Lane**

Alternative 3 would provide dedicated lanes for BRT in portions of the Project corridor. Within this alternative, there are two options, 3a and 3b. For both options, there would be mixed-flow lanes from the Arena in San José to Lafayette Street in Santa Clara, and a 3-mile dedicated BRT lane from Lafayette Street in Santa Clara to Halford Avenue in Santa Clara. The configuration of lanes would differ west of Halford Avenue in Santa Clara to the Palo Alto Transit Center. Alternative 3a would provide no further BRT infrastructure west of Halford Avenue, whereas Alternative 3b would provide a mixed-flow configuration with full bulbout stations west of Halford Avenue.

## **Alternative 4 Long Dedicated Lane**

Alternative 4 would provide a dedicated BRT lane along the Project corridor. Within this alternative there are three options that vary the extent of the dedicated lane, 4a, 4b, and 4c. Each option would include mixed-flow lanes from the Arena in San José to Lafayette Street in Santa Clara and west of the dedicated lane terminus at Embarcadero Road to the Palo Alto Transit Center. The alternatives would differ in the following aspects.

- Alternative 4a would provide a 7.1-mile dedicated lane segment from Lafayette Street in Santa Clara to SR 85 in Mountain View.
- Alternative 4b would have a 10.1-mile dedicated lane segment from Lafayette Street in Santa Clara to Showers Drive in Mountain View.
- Alternative 4c would have the longest dedicated lane segment, 13.9 miles, from Lafayette Street in Santa Clara to Embarcadero Road in Palo Alto.

See Chapter 3, *Project Alternatives* detailed descriptions of the alternatives.

## **ES.4.1.4** Capital, Operations, and Maintenance Costs

Refer to Section 3.4 of Chapter 3 *Alternatives*, for a detailed discussion of capital, operation, and maintenance costs of Build Alternatives. The capital costs of the Locally Preferred Alternative will be funded through the 2000 Measure A Transit Improvement Program from a 30-year countywide 1/2-cent sales tax devoted to specified public transit projects. VTA will also apply to the FTA for a Small Starts grant which funds major transit capital projects that have total net capital costs of less than \$250M and a federal share of less than \$75M.

Capital cost estimates, which include construction, engineering, construction management and administrative costs, range from \$90.6M for Alternative 2 up to \$232.7M for Alternative 4c. See Table ES-1 for capital cost estimates for each option.

Operating costs for Build Alternatives would be funded through the existing sources of VTA operating funds including the 1976 ½-cent sales tax, fare revenues, and California State Transportation Development Act and State Transit Assistance Act funds. Net annual

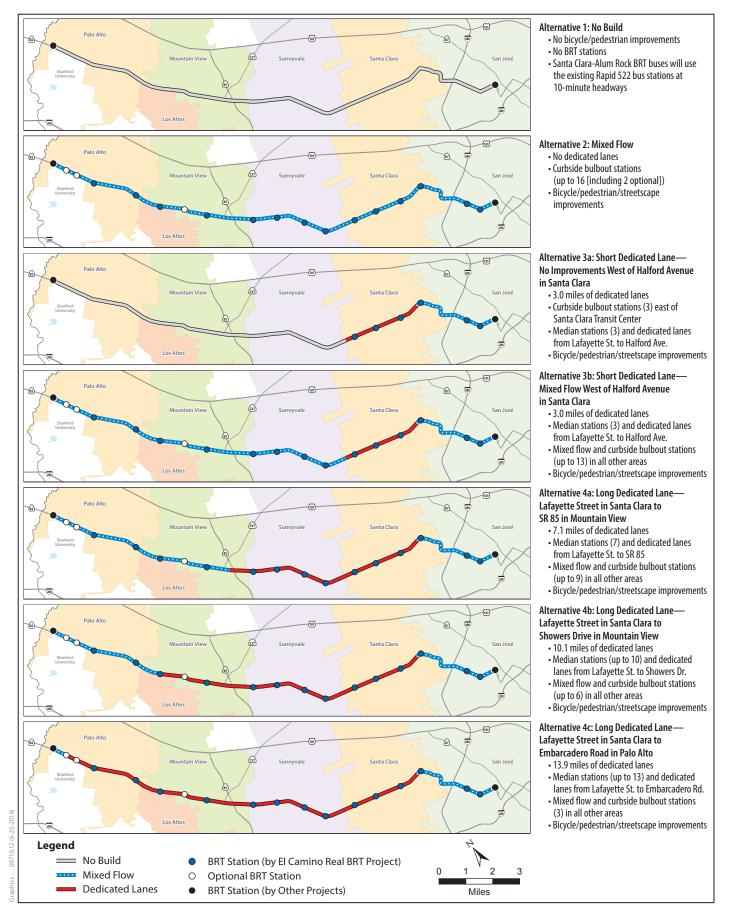

operation and maintenance costs range from \$12.9M for Alternative 4c up to \$22.7M for the No Build Alternative. See Table ES-2 for annual net operation and maintenance costs for each Alternative.

Key Project milestones include the following:

- Final Environmental Clearance/Project Approval June 2015
- Complete Final Design October 2016
- Begin Construction March 2017<sup>2</sup>
- Start Revenue Service October 2018

# **ES.5** Agency and Community Participation

## ES.5.1 Scoping

On February 6, 2013, a Notice of Preparation was posted with the Santa Clara County Clerk's office and sent to the State Clearinghouse at the Governor's Office of Planning and Research to officially solicit statewide agency and public participation in determining the scope of the EIR/EA. Public meetings were conducted on February 21, 2013 and February 28, 2013. A detailed description of the notice of preparation and public scoping meetings is included in Chapter 1, *Introduction*.

## **ES.5.2** Areas of Controversy

Written and oral comments received during the scoping process are on file at VTA's offices (3331 N. First Street, Bldg. B, San José, CA, 95134) and are listed in Appendix A.

Comments regarding environmental impacts focused on the following areas.

- Vehicular traffic impacts and diversion of vehicular traffic off of the Project corridor.
- Air quality and greenhouse gas emissions as a result of increased vehicular idling and traffic.
- Consistency with previously approved land uses and planning documents, as well as growth in the Project corridor.
- Potential impacts on businesses along El Camino Real.
- Emergency vehicle access times.

# ES.6 Summary of Environmental Impacts and Mitigation Measures

Table ES-3 summarizes the environmental impacts that would result under each Project alternative, the significance of the impacts, and the associated mitigation measures (MMs).

Based on analysis completed in the scoping phase, the Project was found to have no impact on the following environmental resources, and thus these environmental resources are not discussed in the EIR/EA:

- Agricultural Resources
- Mineral Resources
- Population and Housing
- Public Services and Recreation (police and fire services are discussed under Utilities)

Under CEQA significance criteria and NEPA criteria for determining effects, the Project would result in no impacts or less than significant impacts relative to the following environmental factors (listed by EIR/EA section):

- Energy
- Land Use and Planning
- Hydrology and Floodplain/Water Quality and Storm water Runoff
- Socioeconomics
- Section 4(f)

With implementation of mitigation measures, the Project would result in less than significant impacts relative to the following environmental factors (listed by EIR/EA section):

- Air Quality and Greenhouse Gas Emissions
- Biological Resources and Wetlands
- Cultural Resources
- Geology, Soils, Seismicity
- Hazardous Materials
- Utilities and Service Systems
- Noise and Vibration
- Environmental Justice

Implementation of any of the Build Alternatives would result in significant and unavoidable impacts in one environmental topic area: Transportation and Traffic. Traffic impacts would result from Project operation under Alternatives 3 and 4. Impacts would be minimized by implementation of mitigation, but impacts would remain significant and unavoidable due to significantly increased delays at some intersections on and off the Project corridor.

# City of Sunnyvale Comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Report of the El Camino Real Bus Rapid Transit Project

#### **General Comments**

### Traffic Analysis

As part of the dedicated lanes alternatives, the traffic analysis states that current traffic on El Camino will divert to other routes within Sunnyvale. These routes include Central Expressway, US 101, I-280, Fremont Avenue, Remington Drive, Evelyn Avenue, and Maude Avenue. Please address the following comments:

- The report does not provide LOS for all the diversion routes such as US-101 and Central Expressway. Please disclose LOS for all diversion routes and analyze possible impacts by diverted traffic.
- The project has significant impacts along Evelyn and Fremont. Will this traffic use other streets instead of corridors that become congested?
- Please explain why vehicles would choose to divert to congested routes such as Evelyn, Fremont, US-101, and Central expressway if the analysis shows that El Camino Real within Sunnyvale would still function at an acceptable LOS.
- Disclose what North-South corridors diverted traffic will use and provide the LOS analysis. Mathilda should be included as part of this analysis.
- If the diversion does not occur as modeled, what will be the LOS for intersections along El Camino?

### Operations

The project is proposing existing mid-block left turn closures. These closures will make access to properties more difficult. Please analyze the following:

- How many additional left-turns will be added at each intersection? Will this create queuing safety issues?
- What mitigation measures should be implemented to accommodate additional left and U-turns?

#### Parking

Off-street parking lots should not be counted towards parking inventory as they are typically designated for corresponding employees and patrons only and should not be considered as "unrestricted parking".

Parking analysis and availability should be completed on a block-by-block basis, not for the entire corridor within Sunnyvale. This will disclose the actual available parking within a reasonable walking distance. Also do not assume parking in residential neighborhoods as available parking for commercial uses.

## Transit Ridership

Provide information on existing and projected ridership numbers for all Sunnyvale stations.

### **Specific Comments**

Page: Figure ES-2 Section: Figure ES-2

*Comment*: This map does not identify all BRT stations as noted in the legend. This comment is also applicable to all other similar maps.

Page: ES-3

Section: ES.4.1 Project Description

Comment: Station Locations. There is little discussion about where the stations will be located. The document assumes the existing 522 station locations will be maintained, but these are not all at the most effective locations along the corridor. For instance, the City of Sunnyvale staff and VTA consultants worked together to identify a better location for the Hollenbeck station location, but the EIR and project assumes the station locations will not change from the existing locations.

The Hollenbeck station is an inferior location along the corridor in Sunnyvale and should BRT be implemented, the station should be moved closer to a far more active and better connected location closer to Sunnyvale Avenue. In its current location at Hollenbeck/Pastoria Avenues, the station would not provide an easy connection to the Downtown area, nor the Caltrain station, and would be further from the busiest part of Sunnyvale along El Camino Real. A location near Sunnyvale Avenue would:

- Place the station with a direct connection to be able to walk, bike or shuttle to the Caltrain station, multi-modal station and downtown area;
- Be located closer to three existing large retail centers and multi-family residential developments; and,
- Provide better service for employees and patients of the Palo Alto Medical Foundation complex.

Page: 3-10

Section: 3.2 Alternatives Considered

Comment: This section describes how stations were chosen, and it states, in part: "Locations were chosen based on level of use of the existing bus stations, proximity to major destinations such as schools, grocery stores, or other popular commercial areas...and proximity to existing multi-modal transit areas..."

Given these facts, the station should be located closer to Sunnyvale Avenue, or closer to Mathilda Avenue to provide maximum service to an active area of Sunnyvale. Additionally, enhanced north/south bus service improvements should be considered for the Sunnyvale-Saratoga Avenue corridor, and extending down Sunnyvale Avenue towards the downtown area and Caltrain station. Having the BRT station close to the Sunnyvale Avenue/El Camino Real intersection along with the future enhanced bus service along that corridor would ensure the important shopping, employment and multi-modal areas are included in the planning of the stations.

Although the Hollenbeck station provides a better separation between stations along the corridor, that aspect should not preempt a more important location in serving the Sunnyvale community. Moving the station closer to Sunnyvale Avenue or Mathilda Avenue would place access to BRT in the Downtown Node, as designated by the

Precise Plan for El Camino Real. The Hollenbeck location is not located inside one of the four nodes as identified in the Sunnyvale Precise Plan for El Camino Real.

The Implementation section of the Precise Plan for El Camino Real supports this change as shown below:

5.8.1 Strengthening the Physical, Visual and Functional Connections Between El Camino Real and Downtown Sunnyvale. It reads (in part), "Physical linkage could include shuttle service or increased bus service, or enhanced sidewalks connecting the two areas along Mathilda Avenue and Sunnyvale Avenue."

Page: 4.2-1

Section: 4.2 Aesthetics and Visual Quality

*Comment*: This section considers the effect BRT stations would have on visual impacts to the area. The impact from the stations has been the only aspect considered as part of this review. One aspect that remains a concern for the Sunnyvale community would be the visual impact a dedicated middle lane would have on median landscaping along the entire stretch of roadway, not just at stations.

Page: 4.4-7

Section: Table 4.4-1 Total Number of Trees Removed by Alternative and City Comment: This table details 130 trees removed as part of the Alternatives 4a, 4b and 4c. Although the biological impact may be reduced through replanting of trees or the payment of in-lieu fees, the loss could represent a significant impact to the visual quality of an important element of the look and feel of El Camino Real in Sunnyvale. This section should be revised to determine the effect the loss of trees will have on the aesthetics and visual quality of the corridor through Sunnyvale.

Page: 4.12-1

Section: Regulatory Setting

Comment: This section should note why the VTA TIA Guidelines are not a regulatory document applicable for this project, but are still used as guidance for some of the analysis.

Page: 4.12-3

Section: Table 4.12-1 Rapid 522 and Local 22 Weekday Ridership (Year 2013)

Comment: This table should identify ridership by City.

Page: 4.12-5

Section: Table 4.12-3 Transit Connections within Project Corridor

Comment: VTA bus 54 has connections at El Camino Real via Pastoria/Hollenbeck,

not Mathilda.

Page: 4.12-7

Section: Intersection Traffic Operation

Comment: Note why 2010 Highway Capacity Manual was not used for traffic analysis rather than the 2000 Highway Capacity Manual

Page: 4.12-8

Section: Table 4.12-4 Existing (2013) Level of Service for Study Intersections along the Project Corridor

Comments Page 3 of 5

Comment: This table identifies the intersection of Mathilda Avenue at El Camino Real as having an existing LOS F during the morning commute hour. Recent studies done for Sunnyvale developments identify this intersection as having an LOS D during the morning commute hours. There is a variance of 20-30 second delay per vehicle between VTA analysis and other recent studies. Please verify this variance.

Page: 4.12-10

Section: Pedestrian Facilities at Bus Stop Areas

Comment: Are intersections near bus stops ADA compliant?

Page: 4.12-11

Section: Table 4.12-5 Bicycle Facilities Connected to Project Corridor

Comment: Class II bike lanes on Mathilda Avenue only exist south of El Camino Real.

Include bike lanes on Cezanne Drive. Please also identify bike routes.

Page: 4.12-14

Section: Transit Service

*Comment*: This section notes that the project would have a beneficial impact on the performance of the transportation system if the project results in a decrease in VMT. Is this VMT measured regionally, locally, or on the project corridor only?

Page: 4.12-15

Section: Traffic Operation

Comment: Identify the version of CA MUTCD used for signal warrants (e.g. 2010,

2012, 2014)

Page: 4.12-19

Section: Study Intersections Selection

Comment: Did intersections have to meet all three criteria items to be analyzed? Were any intersections that met the 50 vph threshold, but not already in the travel demand model not analyzed?

Page: 4.12-35

Section: MM TRA-A: Implement signal optimization, traffic signal installation, and roadway striping improvements at impacted intersections.

Comment: Signal coordination optimization should be applicable to all affected coordinated signals, not just those that are closely spaced intersections

Page: 4.12-41

Section: Parking Occupancy

Comment: Do post-project estimated parking occupancy rates consider a possible

increase in parking demand of for potential park-n-ride for BRT?

Page: 4.14-6

Section: Table 4.14-2 Projects considered for Potential Cumulative Impacts *Comment*: The proposed development at 871 E Fremont Ave, Sunnyvale, CA (i.e. The Butcher's Corner) should be included as part of the cumulative project analysis. The estimated construction schedule for this project is unknown, likely before 2018.

Page: Appendix H, TOA, p.3

Section: Table 2 Summary of Results Compared to the Project's Purpose Comment: This table notes that there will be a five minute headway reduction as a result of SCAR BRT. Does this mean that there will be no further headway improvements as part of ECR BRT? Furthermore, how is the Alternative 1, travel time compare to current travel times (please include percentage)? This same question applies to transit ridership. Please clarify whether these measures are relative to 2018 or existing 2013 as noted in the text.

Page: Appendix H, TOA, p.13

Section: 2.3 Traffic Operations Analysis Methodology Comment: This section should note the following:

- Explanation of why the VTA TIA Guidelines are not followed for analysis.
- Explanation of why the analysis was performed using Synchro instead of Traffixx (VTA's designated standard software package).
- Explanation of why the analysis was done per HCM 2000 rather than the latest version (HCM 2010).
- Explanation of why signal optimization was done prior to, rather than after, the analysis

Page: Appendix H, TOA, p.17-18

Section: 2.3 Traffic Operations Analysis Methodology

Comment: This section notes "However, Sunnyvale does not use the 4-second threshold." Sunnyvale does use the 4-second threshold.

Page: Appendix H, TOA, p.21 & TOA Appendix B

Section: Existing Level of Service

Comment: Existing Level of Services need to be field verified. Staff found some intersections that are not consistent with other analyses or observed conditions. (e.g. AM LOS at Mathilda Avenue and El Camino Real is noted as "F" with an 80.2 sec/veh delay. This is inconsistent with recent analyses with significantly less calculated and observed delay [approximately 30 seconds/veh less]).

Page: Appendix H, TOA, p.96

Section: 10.2 Diversion Route Intersections

Comment: VTA shall fully fund all measures needed to mitigate impacts of the project. As a matter of fact, because all traffic models have limitations, particularly in determining what new routes motorists would select, staff recommends that VTA conduct pre-project and post-project traffic studies be performed to measure the effects of the project. If post-project studies identify unanticipated traffic problems, VTA should commit to provide additional traffic mitigation.
