#### **PRESENTATION**



[18-0476](#) Overview of The Brown Act

Assistant City Attorney, Melissa Tronquet, provided an overview of the Brown Act. Ms. Tronquet answered questions from the Commissioners regarding the Brown Act requirements, public meeting notifications, emails and correspondences, and violations of the Brown Act.

Chair Kenton of the Parks and Recreation Commission requested that the overview presentation be sent to both Commissions.

**ORAL COMMUNICATIONS**

Speaker Mr. Shandor Dektor introduced himself as a resident of Sunnyvale. Mr. Dektor asked the Commissions to consider placing a child-friendly facility such as a park or playground in the Downtown Sunnyvale area. Mr. Dektor described the distance to parks in the vicinity but nothing nearby for those families moving into the newly constructed condominiums or homes. He also addressed the entry point to Ellis Park/School and having to walk to Fair Oaks Avenue to enter.

Superintendent of Parks and Golf, Jim Stark mentioned the Redwood Square area which is a publicly accessible open space of a 1/2 acre in the Downtown Area. Mr. Stark noted that this area is not considered to be a City park or City open space and is unsure what the developer has planned for this area.

Mr. Dektor will consider going to a developer's open meeting to ask about their future plans and request a play area for all to enjoy.

Superintendent Stark offered to talk to Mr. Dektor about easier accessibility to Ellis Park/School.

Assistant Director of Finance, Kenn Lee, provided an overview of the City's Recommended Budget for Fiscal Year 2018/19. Mr. Lee included information on the City's 20-year financial plan, technology enhancements, service delivery and the budget structure and process.

### REPORT TO PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

#### **SUBJECT**

Recommendation to City Council on Naming New City Park at the Vale Development

#### **BACKGROUND**

As part of the conditions of approval for the residential development project known as “The Vale”, located at 915 DeGuigne Drive and 936 E. Duane Avenue, the Developer was required to dedicate to the City and construct park improvements for an 0.8 acre public park at the southwest corner of Duane Avenue and DeGuigne Drive. Conditions of Approval can be found in Report to Planning Commission No. 15-1072. The concept plan for the park is shown as Attachment 2. The construction of the park is substantially completed; punchlist items and park dedication will be finalized for the park opening in Summer 2018.

Naming of a new park follows Council Policy 7.3.23 “Naming/Renaming Parks & Recreation Facility” (Attachment 3) as well as the process established by the Council on June 8, 2004 for naming Plaza Del Sol (Report to Council (RTC) 04-314) and used in naming Swegles Park in 2013 (RTC 13-144). The process set forth was established to engage the community in the park naming decision and first involved soliciting suggestions from the public citywide. Then the Parks and Recreation Commission reviews all suggestions and forwards a recommendation to City Council for a final name decision. In 2013, the Commission forwarded the top ten names to the City Council and the Commission can again forward the top ten names or can recommend fewer than 10 names to City Council, at the Commission’s discretion.

Over a four-week period from March 5 to April 2, 2018, staff solicited names through a variety of City established communication resources for suggested names for the new park. The majority of responses were received from suggestion boxes strategically placed around the City, Open City Hall, and direct email.

The City Council is scheduled to consider this item on July 17, 2018.

#### **EXISTING POLICY**

Council Policy 7.3.23 “Naming/Renaming Parks & Recreation Facilities.”

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**

The action being considered does not constitute a “project” within the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act (“CEQA”) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines section 15378(b)(5) in that it is a governmental organizational or administrative activity that will not result in direct or indirect changes in the environment.

**DISCUSSION**

Soliciting the park name for consideration was advertised to the public via postings to the City's website, email notices, and social media. Drop boxes for the public to submit suggestions were located at the Library, Community Center and Civic Center. The City received 220 entries, representing 121 different names for consideration (Attachment 4 - Name the Park Entries).

In accordance with the Council Policy, the Parks and Recreation Commission is to review the suggested entries and as it did in 2013, forward the top ten names to the City Council or recommend fewer than 10 names to City Council, at the Commission's discretion.

**FISCAL IMPACT**

There is no fiscal impact related to naming of the park. Operating costs for the 0.8 acre park will be absorbed within the existing Parks Program operating budget.

**PUBLIC CONTACT**

Public contact was made through posting of the Parks and Recreation Commission agenda on the City's official-notice bulletin board, on the City's website, and the availability of the agenda and report in the Office of the City Clerk.

**ALTERNATIVES**

1. Recommend the top ten names move forward for consideration and selection by the City Council.
2. Recommend fewer than the top ten names move forward for consideration and selection by the City Council.

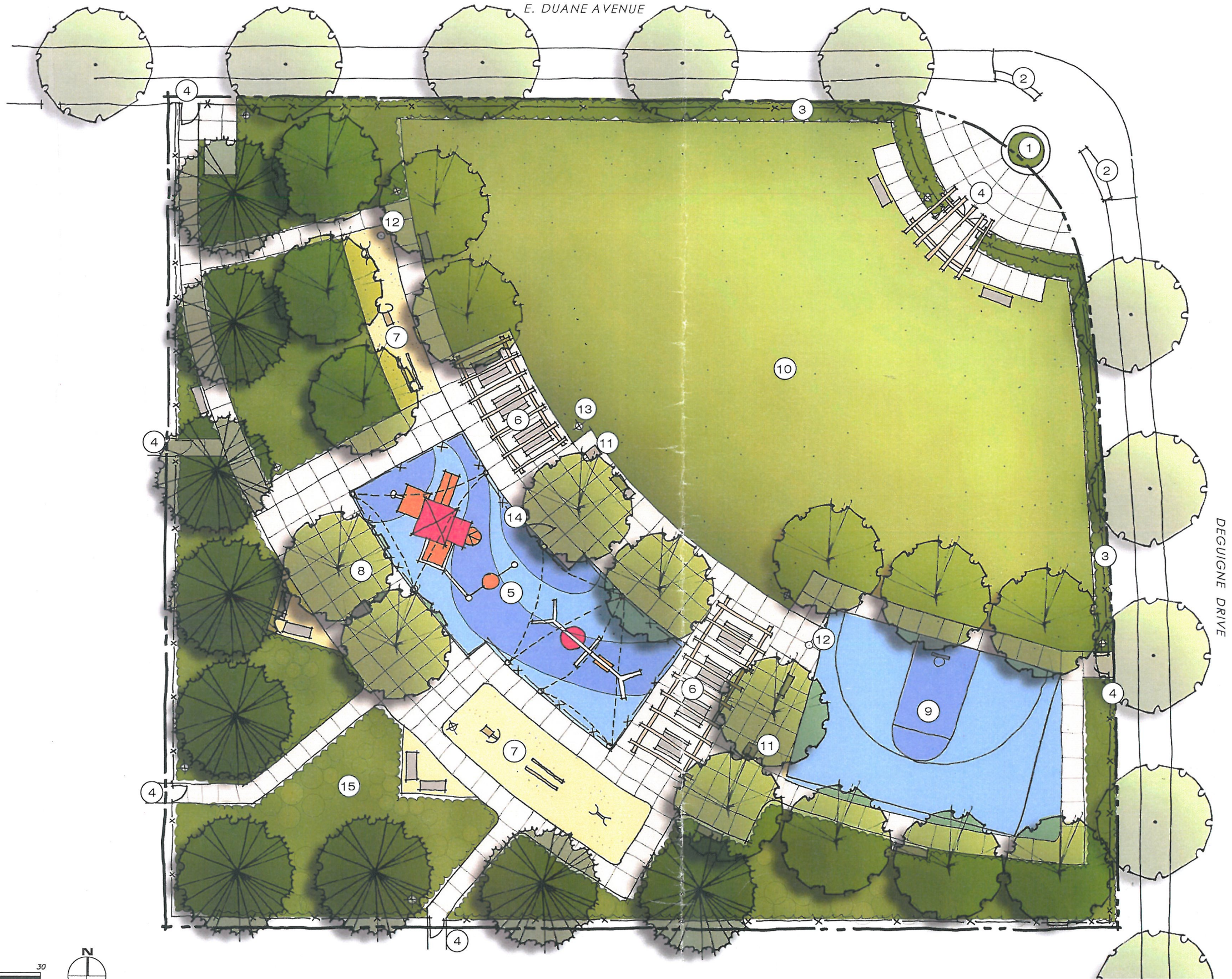

## COUNCIL POLICY MANUAL

**Policy 7.3.23 Naming/Renaming Parks & Recreation Facilities**

---

**POLICY PURPOSE:**

The purpose of this policy is to provide the process and responsibility for naming or renaming City Parks and Recreation facilities.

**POLICY STATEMENT:**

Naming Parks and Recreation facilities shall be the responsibility of the City Council. Any name considerations will first be reviewed by the Parks and Recreation Commission who will make a recommendation to the City Council for naming or renaming any park and recreation facility. The following criteria will be utilized in naming Parks and Recreation facilities:

The majority of City parks presently have the name of the planning district in which they are located. Any new parks should follow the same pattern, if possible. Where this is not possible, the following criteria will be given consideration in naming a park or facility within a park:

1. Greatest consideration should be given to a name that has historical significance to the City of Sunnyvale or is in some other way associated with a Sunnyvale event, historical feature, or other community-related action.
2. Where open space has been purchased that was formerly school property or adjoined a school, and the name of the school has community significance or community recognition, consideration of the school name should be given in naming the park.
3. Naming a park for a specific individual will only be considered if that individual has made a significant contribution to the City of Sunnyvale. Names honoring individuals or families of living persons must be supported by compelling reasons.
4. Other name considerations will only be considered if one of the three above criteria does not provide a suitable name.
5. Facilities within a park which have not otherwise been named by Council may be provided identification signs by staff, limited to either the word "Sunnyvale" or the Park's official name, followed by a generic description of the facility. (e.g. "Las Palmas Dog Park" or "Sunnyvale Skatepark").
