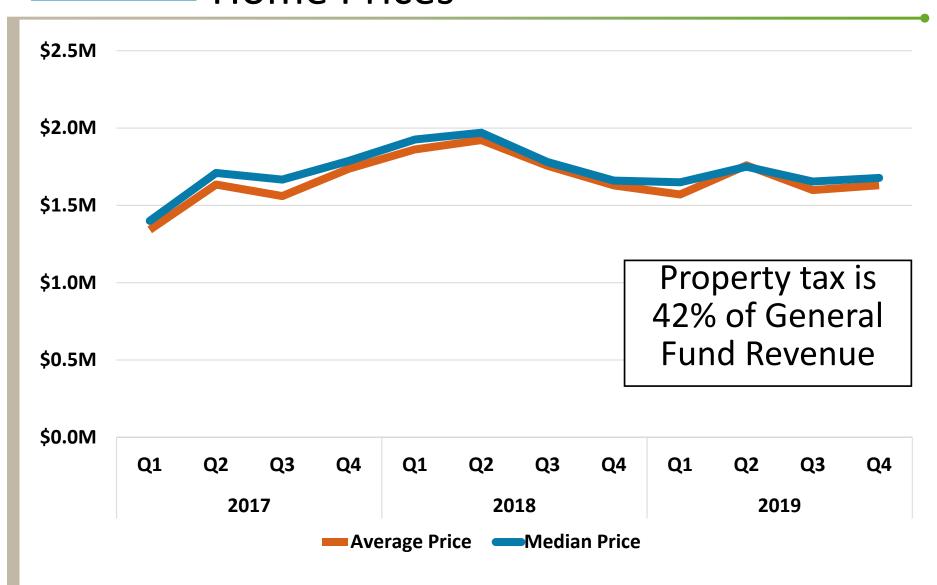

# Funding the Climate Action Playbook

- Adopted by Council in August 2019
- Implementation Budget:
  - Updated CAP budget approved in FY 2019/20
  - Ongoing Operating Costs ~\$500K/year
    - 2 FTE: Environmental Program Specialist and Transportation Planner
  - One-time ~\$1.6M over three years;
     Consultants, Temp Staffing
- Funding for actions in CAP beyond FY 2021-22 still to be fully identified

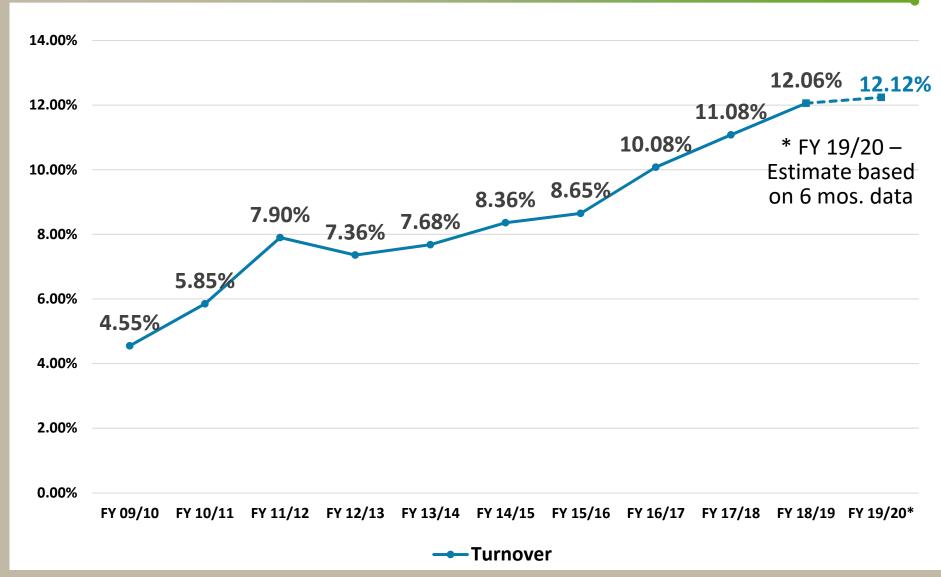
### Authorized FTE Counts (as of 12/28/2019)



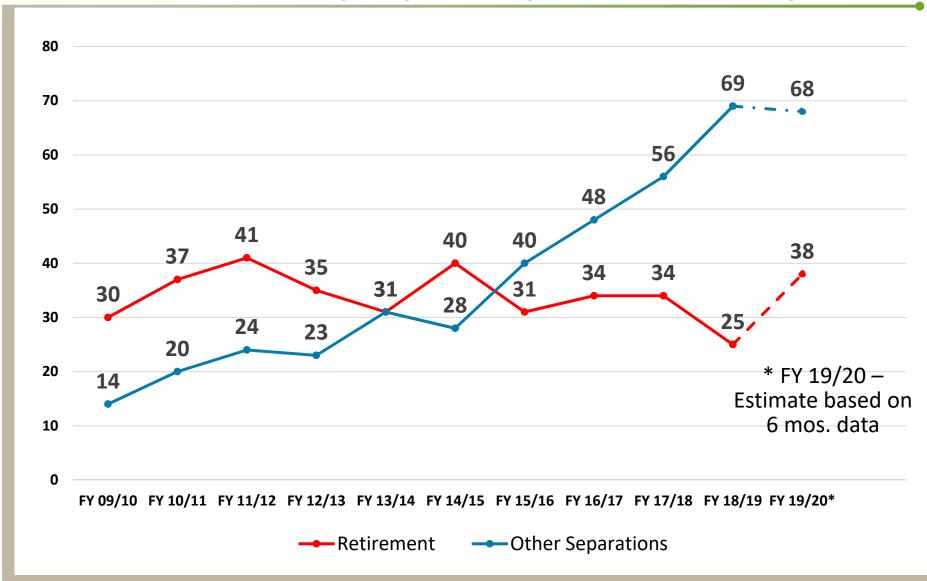
## Staffing Level Trends (2009-2019)



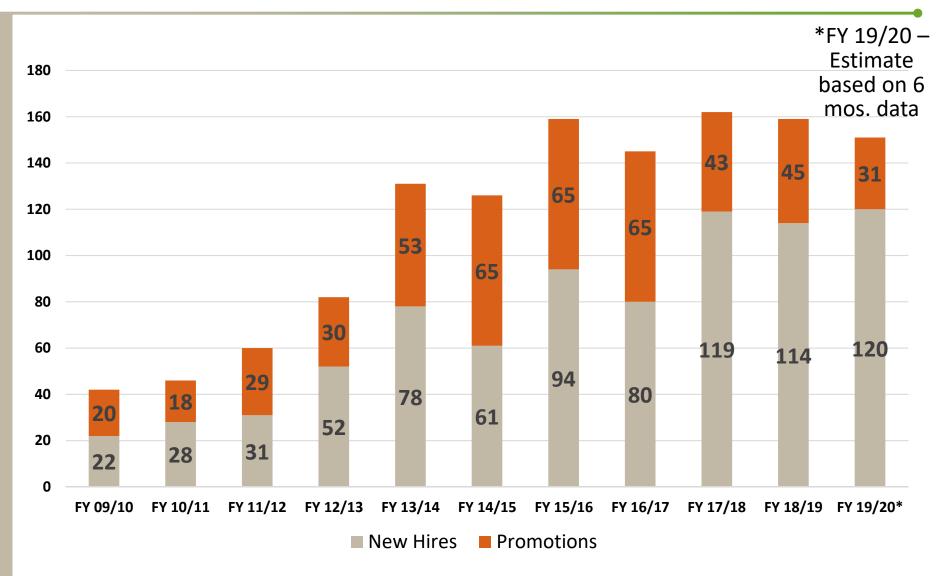
### Historical City-wide Turnover Rate

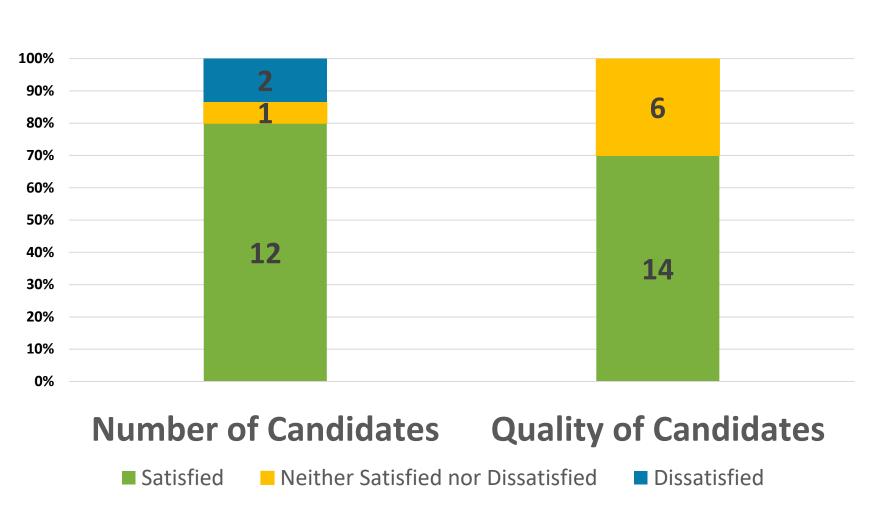

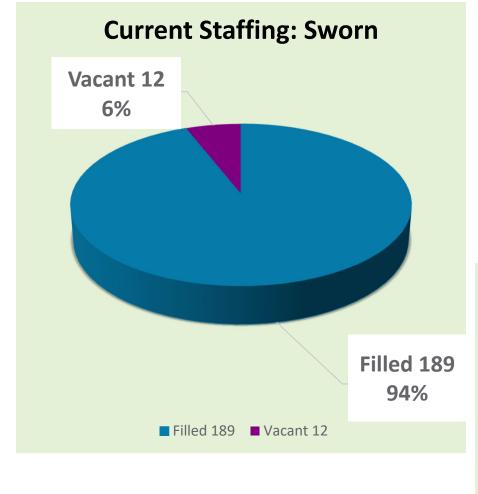




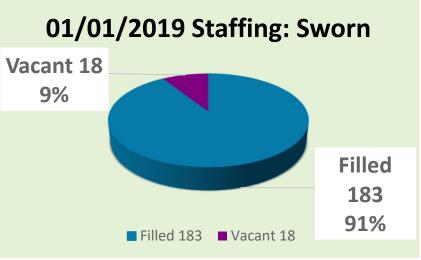

### Recruitment & Training

- Ongoing funding for the selection, recruitment and training of new recruits over the next 20 years.
- Each project is based on a two-year budget plan that covers the entire training cycle of a cohort of recruits.
- Costs are all inclusive until training is complete.
- Twenty-year plan increased by \$22.3 M
- The twenty-year investment for recruitment and training projects is approximately \$84 million.

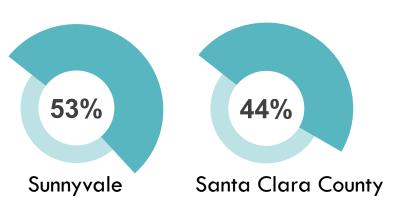

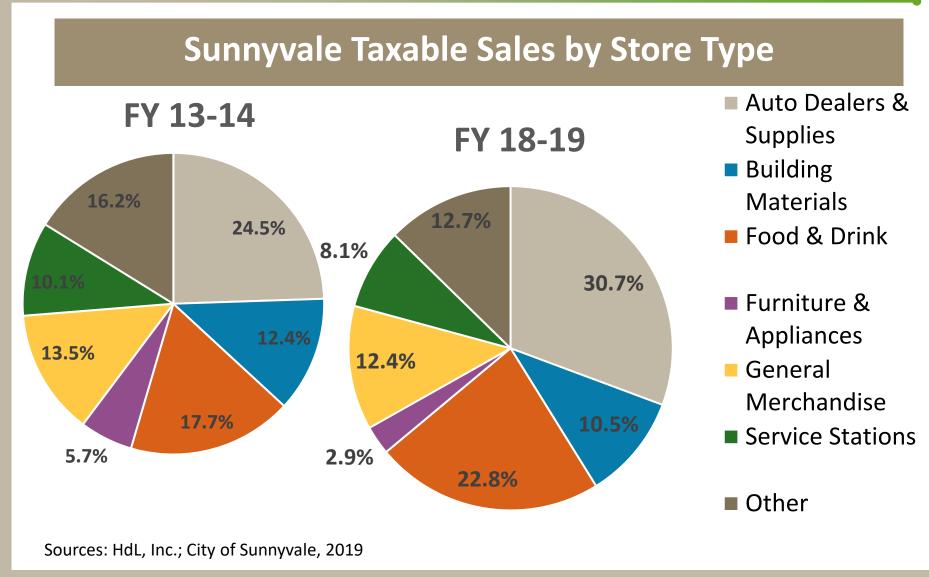

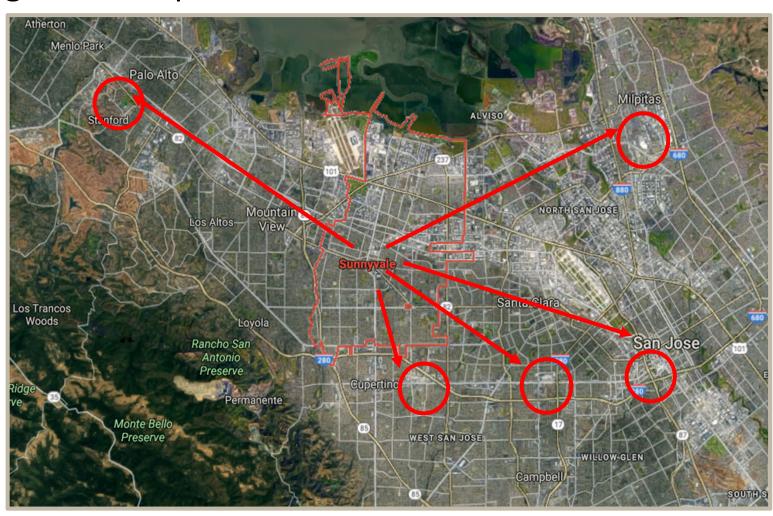

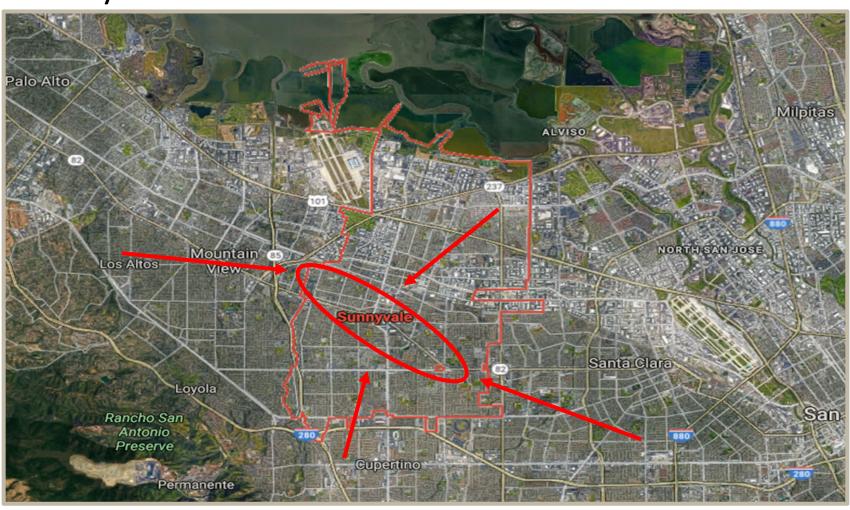

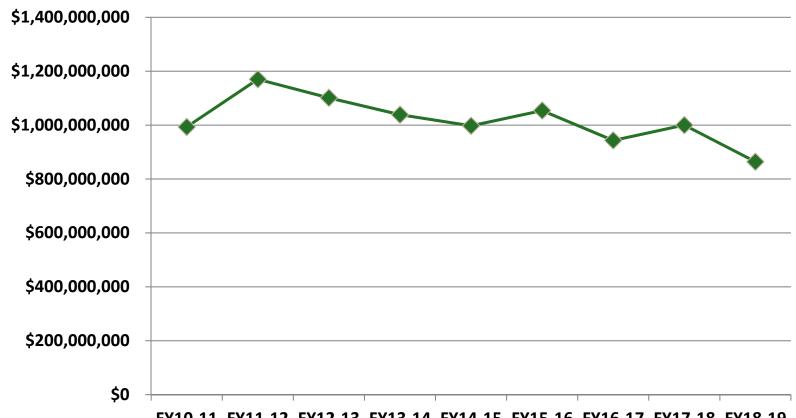

## Moffett Park Specific Plan (MPSP)

#### History and Background

- 2004 Adoption
  - Four Site-specific Amendments



Purpose: Attract Class A Office Development

- Features:
  - MPSP Specific Zoning Allows:
    - Buildout: 24.3M s.f. office
    - Development Reserve: 5.4M s.f.
  - Green Building Requirements and Incentives
  - TDR Transfer of Development Rights (not yet used)
  - Hotels: preserve existing and allow additional

## Moffett Park Specific Plan

#### **Current Plan Status**

- Development Reserve: now at 135,000 square feet
- Overall Moffett Park at ~20 M square feet
- Request to update MPSP in 2018 (by Google)
  - 100% funded by 3 major property owners

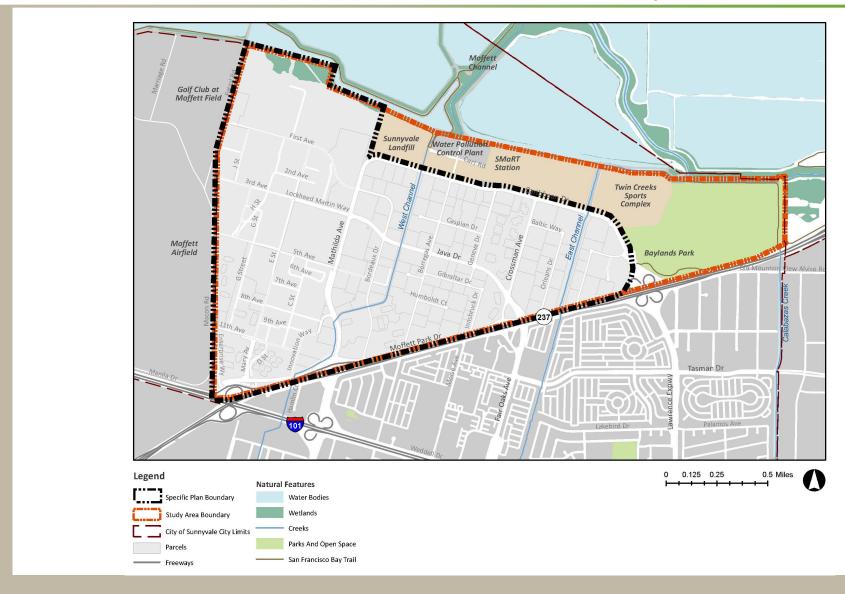

- \$1 M starting in FY 2020/21.
- Escalates 2% per year total of \$25 M over 20 years

## Resolution of Golf Course Operations

Current General Fund Financial Plan has \$7.9 M in transfers through FY 2023/24 to golf

Fund Requires Approximately \$2 M per year starting in FY 2024/25

Either new revenue, increased number of rounds, or ongoing subsidy

Two courses currently generate approximately \$2.5 M in revenue from rounds and the driving range

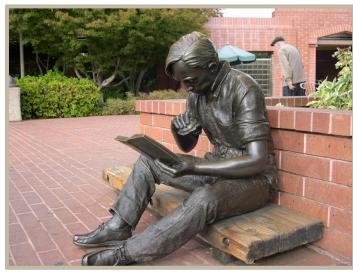
#### Climate Action Plan

- Current budget includes \$1.6 million over three years for implementation and approximately \$500 K per year for staffing and program support
- Unfunded needs include:
  - Funding for other plans that support CAP implementation (e.g. urban forestry or active transportation)
  - Additional \$500 K to \$1 M annually for other programs and outreach in support of the plan

#### Other Unfunded Needs

- Future main library operations
- Funding for growth in staffing to meet increasing demands

Bottom Line: Service Level Set Aside is quickly consumed by existing, identified needs





## Staying the Course

- Continue with the existing process it allows for needs to be evaluated within the context of the budget through the study/budget issues process
- Maintain a focus on General Plan goals, service levels, and Council policy – staff recommends approach and resources needed to meet Council goals
- Maintain a long view utilize twenty-year planning through the budget process to evaluate use of SLSA

# Site Specific Density

#### Factors for Selecting Sites for Higher Density

- Lot size (Minimum 1 or 1.5 acres)
  - Requires smaller parcels to assemble
- Lot depth
- Corner parcels
- Existing context
  - Type/quality of development
  - Likelihood to redevelop
  - Adjacent land uses
  - Age of adjacent development
- Other Factors

# Response to SB 330

#### Appearance

- 54 and 68 du/ac would look similar
- Bulk/massing would be controlled by same:
  - Height
  - Setback
  - Step back
  - Daylight plane



- 68 du/ac would likely result in more smaller units
  - More 1 & 2 Bedroom units
  - Density may vary across site to respect neighbors

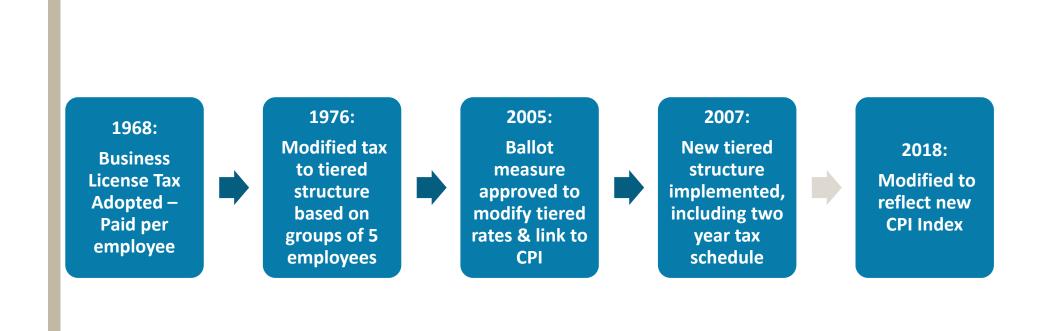

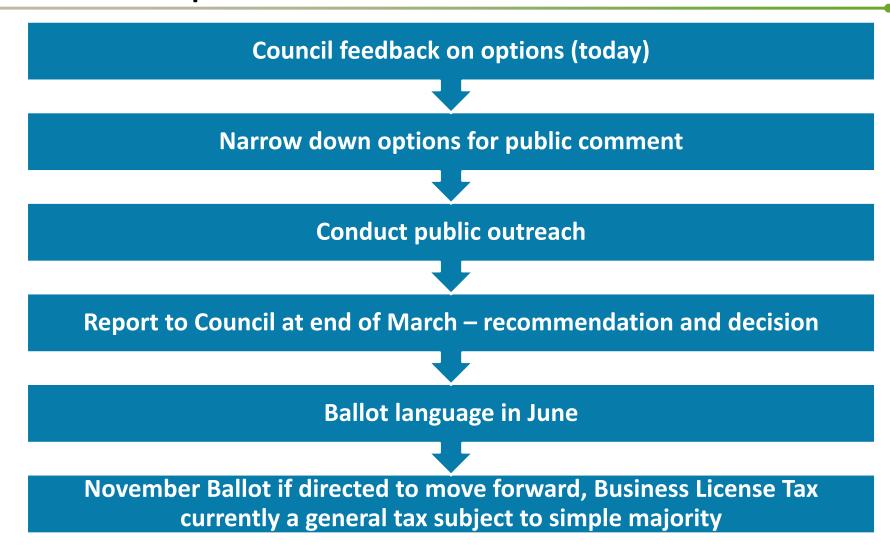
