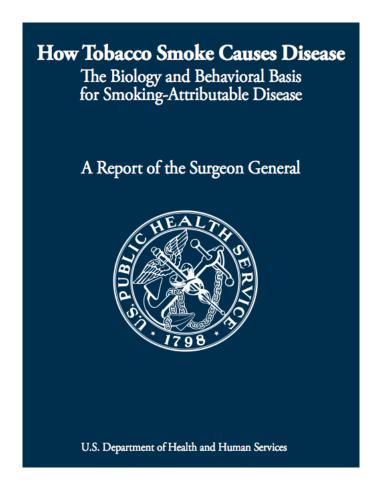

Smokefree Study Areas

- Outdoor dining
- 2. Entryways
- 3. Multi-family housing
 - Common areas
 - Buffer zones around buildings
 - Individual units

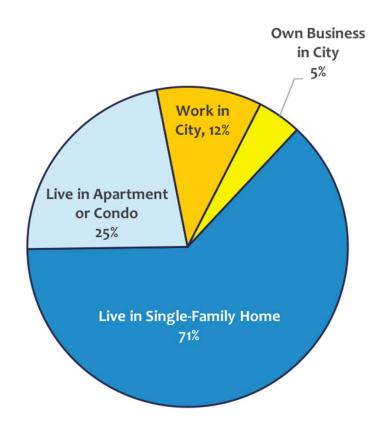
Dangers of Secondhand Smoke



- No safe level of exposure
- Secondhand smoke (SHS)
 exposure can cause asthma, heart
 disease, cancer, SIDS, etc.
- Smoke can travel through doorways, wall cracks, and vents
- Nearly 1/3 of multi-family housing residents in SCC reported smelling smoke in past week
- Smokefree housing benefits: healthier, cleaner, safer

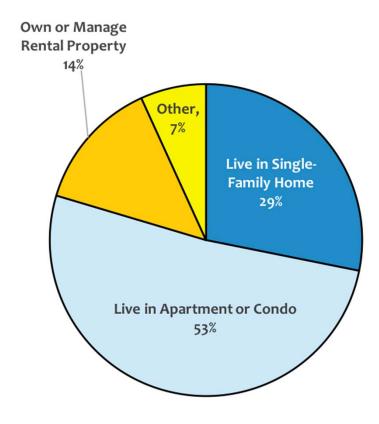
Survey #1: Smokefree Areas

- Open City Hall
 Aug 19 Sep 14, 2015
- Sent to >3,000 people
- 910 views
- 349 responses

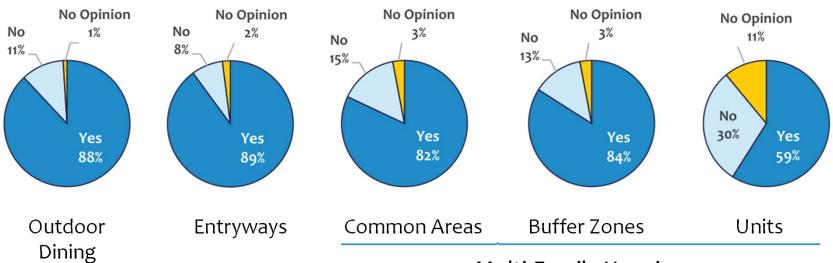


Survey #2: Multi-Family Housing

- Open City Hall
 Dec 18, 2015 Jan 6 2016
- Aimed at multi-family residents, owners & managers
- 476 views
- 182 responses



Should Smoking be Prohibited In...



Multi-Family Housing

Existing Smoking Policies

- Called large apartment complexes (100 units or more)
- 25 reached out of 40
- 22 prohibit smoking in common areas
- 16 prohibit smoking inside units



Smokefree Outdoor Dining



- Currently 60% smokefree outdoor dining required
- Staff recommends: 100%, including bars and restaurants
- 73 local laws statewide, including 7 in Santa Clara County

Smokefree Entryways

- State law: no smoking within 20 feet of government buildings
- Staff recommends: 25 feet no-smoking zone around buildings where smoking prohibited
 - Offices
 - Stores
 - Places of worship, etc.
- 90 local laws statewide, including 6 in Santa Clara County



Smokefree Multi-Family Housing



- Apartments
- Condominiums
- Townhomes
- Duplexes
- Four-plexes, etc.

Smokefree Common Areas



- Staff recommends smokefree indoor and outdoor
 - Walkways
 - Courtyards
 - Pool areas, etc.
- 68 local laws statewide
 - 2 in Santa Clara County
 - 6 in San Mateo County

Smokefree Buffer Zones

- Staff recommends no smoking within 25 feet of multi-family
 - Doorways
 - Windows
 - Vents, etc.



Smokefree Units



- Staff recommends:
 100% smokefree units
- Optional: designated smoking areas
- 38 laws statewide, 1 in Santa Clara, 4 in San Mateo Counties

Smokefree Units: Enforcement

- Becomes part of city law
- Landlords add to lease
- Enforcement: landlords and city in cooperation
- Complaint-driven
- Few complaints in cities with existing laws
- Education and warnings effective in encouraging compliance

Residents Who Smoke

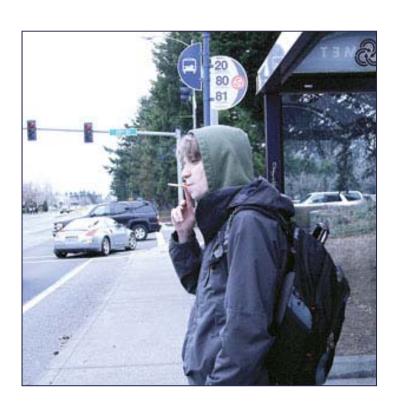


- Fewer than 10% of Santa Clara residents smoke
- Ordinance limits where people can smoke, residents don't have to quit
- Optional: designated smoking areas
- Can also smoke on sidewalks

Additional Survey Responses

Asked for smokefree:

- Service areas
 - ATMs
 - Ticket lines
 - Bus/transit stops
- Public events
- Downtown areas



"I often walk with my newborn in downtown Sunnyvale. We cannot eat/sit in outdoor dining places because there are always people smoking there."

"Those of us who do not smoke should be able to safely get in and out of a non-smoking building."

"If you live in multi-family housing, why should you have to inhale second hand smoke?"

"We have a chain smoker next door and if our windows are open smoke fills our house."

"What people do in their own home is no one's business but their own."

"Each complex should be able to set its own policies and the tenants can live with it or move."

"Too restrictive. And where would these people go and smoke?"

"I have owned 20 units since 1977 on Kodiak Ct., Sunnyvale. I included no smoking anywhere in the units, and on the property inside and outside since ~ 1985 as part of my Rental Agreement. It has not been a problem to enforce. A tenant has to stand in the street to smoke. They shortly stop smoking. I have many young children living in my units that should not be exposed to smoke."
