## Background

- Sunnyvale residents created holiday light arches in downtown Sunnyvale for the 2020 holiday season.
- Feedback from the community was very positive, especially due to the stresses from covid.
- Neighborhood groups plan to light up longer stretches of McKinley Ave, Sunnyvale Ave and California Ave in 2021.

## Inspiration from nearby cities

We would like to make the 2021 holidays even more festive, and are inspired by nearby cities' partnership with the community. Examples:

- Burlingame: <u>Holiday parade</u>
- Redwood City: <u>Hometown Holidays</u>

# Original concept for Sunnyvale (We've decided to pursue other concepts since)

- The original concept was to deck up Redwood Square, beside Macy's.
- After estimating the budget and logistics required to implement this concept, we are no longer pursuing this concept for 2021.
- We can revisit this concept in 2022, based on the community's feedback.



## 3 resident-led proposals, in downtown Sunnyvale


We have three proposals for the 2021 winter holidays, to be led by Sunnyvale residents, in partnership with the City of Sunnyvale.

- 1. <u>Sunnyvale Ave</u>: Cupcakes and candy canes.
- 2. Location TBD: Sunnyvale Gingerbread village.
- 3. <u>Washington Ave</u>: Light arches and solar lights on the big tree.



## Proposal 1: Cupcakes & candy canes on Sunnyvale Ave

Place cupcake sculptures between the bushes.





Wrap the trees and lamp posts so they look like candy canes.





## Proposal 1: Cupcakes & candy canes on Sunnyvale Ave

#### When

Month of December 2021

#### Where

- West side of Sunnyvale Ave, from Washington Ave to Evelyn Ave.
- This street is well lit. The dirt ground between the bushes is not irrigated, and is mostly level.

#### **Community participation**

- We shall invite the community to create up to 40 cupcakes and 20 candy canes, by hosting workshops and providing instructions.
- For variety, we can also do a mix of cupcakes, gumdrops, lollipops and candy canes.

#### Set up and take down


We can invite community volunteers to set up and take down.
 The decor can be returned to the volunteers who made them after the display period, so that storage will not be required.

#### Safety

 In order to prevent theft of the cupcakes, <u>cable locks</u> shall be used to tie the cupcakes to adjacent trees and sign posts. Cables shall be covered using <u>cord covers</u>, to prevent tripping hazards.

#### Partnership requested with the City of Sunnyvale

- Permission to use the space as described.
- Assistance with set up and take down.



### Proposal 2: Sunnyvale Gingerbread village

- Invite the community to build a Sunnyvale Gingerbread village.
- Unveil it at the Sunnyvale Holiday Tree Lighting event.
- Display it somewhere viewable by the public, e.g. Sunnyvale library, Murphy Ave, or somewhere else.

## Proposal 2: Sunnyvale Gingerbread Village

#### When

Month of December 2021

#### Where

Location TBD

#### **Community participation**

 We shall invite the community to create the gingerbread houses for display in the Sunnyvale Gingerbread Village.

#### Set up and take down

 We can invite community volunteers to set up and take down. The Gingerbread village can be composted after the display period.

#### Partnership requested with the City of Sunnyvale

- Identify a space for the Sunnyvale Gingerbread Village that is viewable by the public.
- Assistance with set up and take down.

## **Proposal 3: Lights on Washington Ave**

Install arches to make a light tunnel on Washington Ave

## **Proposal 3: Lights on Washington Ave**

#### When

Month of December 2021.

#### Where


 South side of Washington Ave, from Sunnyvale Ave to Murphy Ave.

#### **Community participation**

 For the solar lanterns, we can invite the community to deck up the lanterns so they look like giant ornaments. (Reference: <u>video</u>)

## Partnership requested with the City of Sunnyvale

- Permission to use the space as described.
- Provide electricity.
- Installation of the light arches and solar lights on the big tree, e.g. using a Genie lift.
- We will also seek to partner with CityLine / Sares Regis as appropriate.



## **Budget & Funding**

#### **Budget**

- Proposal 1: Cupcakes @ \$25 each + \$20 each to secure with locks. Candy canes @ \$10 each.
- Proposal 2: Minimal (assuming that residents create gingerbread houses at their expense).
- Proposal 3: Arches @ \$20 each. Solar lanterns @ \$12 each

If the proposals are approved, we will seek funding through donations from residents and local organizations. Any funding that the City of Sunnyvale can provide would be greatly appreciated.

## **Next steps**

- Update proposal, based on feedback from City staff, Arts Commissioners and other stakeholders.
- Revert with implementation details, such as:
  - Solicit funding and sponsorship from local organizations.
  - Engage volunteers from the community to make cupcakes and gingerbread houses (e.g. residents, school groups, neighborhood groups, local clubs).
  - Plans for setting up, tearing down, and storage.

# Reasons for deferring original concept @ Redwood Square

- The original concept was to deck up Redwood Square (beside Macy's) for 6 weeks, from Thanksgiving to New Year's. Mockup below.
- We consulted with Jason Minsky, Executive Director of San Jose's Christmas in the Park since 2012. Here are some recommendations, based on learnings in San Jose:
  - Hire Security personnel to prevent theft.
  - Stop grass irrigation during the display period.
  - Potentially re-plant grass after removing the displays.
- While sensible, these recommendations would require a sizable budget and deeper collaboration with CityLine. Let's start with simpler concepts in 2021, and expand in 2022+ based on the community's feedback.

## How to make the cupcakes (suggested method)



3 gallon pot (for plants). The holes at the bottom of the pot will be used to loop the security cables through.



Glue fabric to cover the pot. Use waterproof, mold resistant fabric like Ottertex marine vinyl.



Plastic dome lid. For public display, we shall use a dome made of a sturdier grade of plastic.



Glue fabric to cover the dome. Use <u>waterproof</u> <u>ripstop fabric</u>, which is used for making camping tents.
